Yes, Look It Over

The state health board will have a representative here shortly to investigate the dangers of the government canal that runs through Klamath's best residential district. Dr. Strocker of the state board is interested in making a survey of that canal and its attending dangers to health and safety of the people.

By all means, we say, "come and look it over." Those of us who live here know the outcome of this investigation. We know that several visits of the board are needful to form a final conclusion. When the canal is running full, as it is at the present time, samples of the water may not be so vile; but when low water comes and the carcasses of dead cats and dogs begin to show, when the decayed debris sends rank odors into the air, it is then that the board of health will get the true condition of the canal. Aside from that is the danger to people, for the canal has claimed several lives already, and is sure to claim more unless something is done to protect the public.

Judge Butler, the republican candidate for congress, was not slow to see the position Klamath Falls is placed in by an unfinished job on the part of the United States government. The canal should be put in a conduit, and under no consideration can the expense charged to this irrigation project. It is a plain instance where the government has erred, and it is up to the congress of the nation to correct that error.

Our Meat House Faces Danger

Just now, when the weather is hot, the air and forests dry, and the fire-fighting ability limited, Klamath Falls faces a danger to her meat house; for, after all, the forest furnishes the pork chops for most of her people.

It is, therefore, of the greatest importance that each citizen be on her guard, not only to prevent a forest fire from starting, but to be ready to work to put it out, just as you worked in the old days to save a neighbor's home when it was on fire.

In this day of paid fire departments we are all prone to get out of the habit of grabbing a bucket or a spade when the fire alarm is given. But that old habit should assert itself again when one is in the country and sees smoke in the timber.

This county's entire population should be a volunteer fire department in the case of forest fires, for the meat house is a mighty important thing to all of us.

The Tornado Pest

How many ever give thanks to Providence for being permitted to live on this Pacific coast? Look at Florida—the great Florida, with its wealth and vast development of late—now entertaining tornado after tornado along the coast. Then think of the steady weather we have in this country. Of course, we all reserve the right to say it is hot today, and many think the heat is terrible. By comparison all you need to do is to read the papers and note what is happening in other parts of the nation.

Truly, the weather on this Pacific slope is worth a lot to us, and we should think of that feature of life occasionally.

sloping east slope of the Cascade Range and a natural course along the Santiam river, and gave an estimate of the project as he had viewed it. He said he knew of no better route than that one.

Robert W. Sawyer, member of the state highway commission, a Bend newspaper publisher, said he believed a railroad route through Hog Pass would relieve the Columbia Gorge route during the winter months when it was blocked with snow.

He said that while the country around Bend was well served by the present roads, the opening of a road west through the Cascades would mean additional development and would facilitate the moving of lumber.

Mr. Sawyer also described the Deschutes irrigation project which would reclaim thousands of acres. L. C. Michenex, of Cottage Grove, told of the advantages his section of the state would gain through the opening of a more direct eastern route.

The voice of Douglas county in support of the cross state line was heard in a plea for additional rail facilities for outlet of the timber and fruit of that region.

H. M. Fox said that development of timber resources east of Sutherlin was being held up because of lack of transportation.

Frank J. Norton, of Sutherlin, fruit raiser and canner, said

fresh fruits of the district would reach eastern markets two to three days sooner by a cross-state route. The line would mean a saving to fruit interests.

William J. Hanley, pioneer of Harney county, testified last yesterday, telling of the resources of the central part of the state. He said the late J. J. Hill had planned a cross-state artery.

COMMISSIONER STOPS SALE OF TOBACCO STOCK

Concern Must First Secure Stockbrokers License, Ruling

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 10. (UP)—The Union Tobacco company must either qualify as stockbrokers under the Oregon blue sky law or cease their sale of corporation stock along with their cigarettes, according to Mark McAllister, state corporation commissioner.

According to McAllister, the Union Tobacco company has been selling cigarettes at \$7 per carton to retailers in this state as compared to a price of \$6 per carton quoted for the same grade of cigarettes by other manufacturers. As an incentive to pay this higher price, McAllister states that the Union Tobacco company has been including with each carton of cigarettes a coupon good for fourteen \$1.000 of one share of common stock, exchangeable for the common stock when the retailer has accumulated enough of the coupons.

This scheme, according to McAllister, is merely another way of selling common stock in the corporation and represents a violation of the blue sky law inasmuch as the tobacco company has never attempted to qualify as stockbrokers.

NAME OFFICERS AFTER BATTLE

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 10. (AP)—The American Hospital association convention here prepared today to install officers elected last night after a 36-hour battle that for a time threatened to end in the courts.

The election was won by the "insurgent" faction, which nominated Dr. Christopher G. Parnall, of Rochester, N. Y., for the presidency after the nominations committee had named Frank E. Chapman, of Cleveland, Ohio, as the "regular" candidate. The balloting was so close that the "regulars" telegraphed to Cleveland, asking 52 supporters of Chapman to telegraph their votes. The votes were cast.

The move took the Parnall group by surprise. They protested against "proxy voting," and promptly telegraphed to New York urging absent members of their faction to vote by wire. Delegates said 21 votes for Parnall were telegraphed, but arrived after the ballot box had been closed.

FEELING HIGH OVER DEATH OF PEASANT HERO

ZAGRES, Yugoslavia, Aug. 10. (AP)—Fear that serious disturbances might occur here as a result of the death Wednesday of Stephan Raditch, peasant party leader, was increased last night when the government's offer of a state funeral for the dead statesman was refused.

Followers of Raditch, who died as a result of a shooting fray in the chamber of deputies, blamed the government party for his death. Because of the intense feeling which was aroused among members of the peasant party by the shooting, the government's offer of a state funeral was taken as a conciliatory gesture.

Police and military guards were still on duty in streets and at principle buildings tonight.

SEVERE STORM STRIKES OHIO

ALLIANCE, O., Aug. 10. (A. P.)—Severe electrical and rain storms that lashed diagonally across northern Ohio, struck with full force near here last night and caused at least one death, resulted in the derailment of a Pennsylvania passenger train and damaged much property, according to meagre reports received here today. Disruption of communication hampered efforts to learn the full extent of the damage.

ALFRED SMITH IN WINDY CITY

CHICAGO, Aug. 10. (AP)—Governor Alfred E. Smith of New York and a party of eastern democratic leaders arrived in Chicago at 10:22 a. m. today to pay their final respects to George E. Brennan, the late democratic chief of Illinois, at his funeral services. Their train, the Twentieth Century Limited, pulled into the station twenty minutes ahead of schedule.

WOOL BUSINESS PICKS UP FAST

Commercial Bulletin Reports Activity in National Market

HOSTON, Aug. 10. (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow: "There has been more business in wool, some times at slightly lower prices. Sales have been heaviest apparently in eight months; Texas wools at around \$1.00 clean basis, although half-blood combing wool is the strongest quality in the market. Fine staple wools and quarter-bloods are very slow. Woolen mills are buying very sparingly.

Wool quotations will be published tomorrow: Oregon, fine and F. M. staple \$1.12; fine and F. M. French combing \$1.03 and \$1.05; fine and F. M. clothing, 95c and \$1.00; alley No. 1, \$1.05 and \$1.08. Mohairs: Original bag average 12 months Oregon 70c-72c, Graded Stock: First combing \$8c-9c, good carding 55c-60c.

BELGIUM PROHIBITION PLAN SUCCESS

WILMISTOWN, Mass., Aug. 10. (UP)—Belgium has worked out a system of semi-prohibition which has resulted in far-reaching benefits to her people, according to Dr. Louis Pierard, member of the Belgium chamber of deputies, who spoke at the Institute of Politics here.

The law, which was made effective in 1919, substituted temperance for abstinence, he said, and as a result working men drink less and the whole nation has been made more temperate in all habits.

"Beer consumption has decreased by 46 per cent since 1913," Dr. Pierard continued. "The number of cafes had diminished by nearly half and only wine, beer, and soft drinks are allowed."

Prof. Charles W. Hackett of the University of Texas predicted that Senor Aaron Sazenz, recent minister of foreign affairs in Mexico, will be the next president of that country.

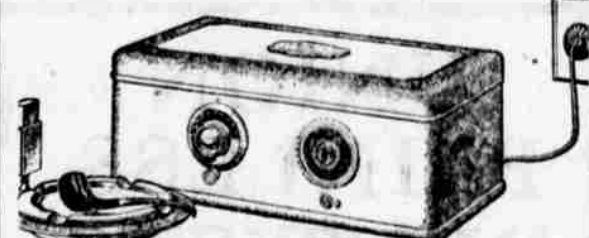
