excellent demonstrations of different methods of treating potatoes; and of the use of commercial fertilizers with the crop. These will be carefully checked at harvest time for yield, disease, etc.

"The acreage in clover is increasing. Seed yields from last year's crop show it to be one of the most profitable crops in Klamath and Lake counties. The

the Barns and Union Experiment Stations where the altitude is high.

"Withcombe beardless, hunchback and trap barleys are showing up well. Golden Grain, three grain, Kanota and markon, (a smut proof variety) are the most promising oats. Federation seems the leading wheat at a number of places. The field appearance is excellent and when these yields are secured, it will give a line on which varieties to standardize upon.

"One of the most valuable demonstrations is at Fort Klamath, on the farms of Nicholson Bros. and H. Mallory. On these places where dairying is the important business, trials of different grains with field peas and Hungarian

vetch give promise of much better yields and quality of feed than that secured from many of the old sod bound meadows. While this work is brand new and only in the preliminary stages, thick stands of vetch and 7-foot field peas look good.

"Ladino clover, the new giant pasture clover, is also making a very encouraging showing.

"While there is much to do in standardization on good seed of the best varieties, a few years of certification work will soon bring that to pass with the grain and potatoes. However, the question of more clover seed and the growing of the potatoes and grain in rotation with it is of even greater economic importance at this time."
