CARDS SET OUT TO STRENGTHEN TEAM FOR TEST

St. Louis Manager Determined to Hold Narrow Lead in National

Following the example set by the New York Yankees, the prospective world's series rivals, the St. Louis Cardinals, in a slump and well aware of that fact, have sent out an emergency call for assistance.

The Yanks, after a disastrous western trip, recovered their normal winning form almost simultaneously with the arrival of Fred Heimach, left-handed pitcher from St. Paul. Heimach won his first start as a Yankee and the rest of the staff took a turn for the better immediately thereafter.

Cards Need Bolstering
Now the Cardinals plan to bring new faces into their lineup in an effort to protect the slim two and a half game lead they hold over the New York Giants in the National league. Club officials, including president Sam Breadon and manager Bill McKechnie, announced yesterday that outstanding players on Cardinal "farms" in the minors would be recalled in an effort to check the Redbirds' slide.

"We are going to do everything in our power to check this slump," said McKechnie who managed the Pittsburgh Pirates to a National league and world's championship in 1925. "It will be tough to cut players off the list but the big thing is to protect our lead and win the pennant. Sentiment will have no place in our operations."

McKechnie should know all about sentiment—or lack of it—in the major leagues. After leading the Pirates to the title in 1925 McKechnie was let out the following year when internal dissension wrecked the Pirates' chances of repeating.

The Cardinal announcement that it was going into the byways for new talent overshadowed the routine news of the two big leagues.

Pirates Beat Dodgers
Only one game was played in the National circuit, Remy Kremer, the big Frenchman, pitching the Pirates to an easy 6 to 1 decision over the slipping Brooklyn Dodgers. Kremer, now showing the form that was expected of him, gave the Robins only six hits and never was in trouble.

In the American league the Philadelphia Athletics shaved another half game off their lead when Lefty Grove, who now mixes judgment with his fast one, beat the Tigers, 7 to 1. Lefty fanned only two men where he used to whiff a dozen but the Tigers got only two hits off the lean left-hander's delivery. Those two singles and a wild throw by Mickey Cochrane in the fourth inning saved the Tigers from a shutout. The A's victory put them four and a half games back of the Yankees.

In the only other Major league conflict of the day Ed Morris registered his 15th triumph of the season when he pitched the Boston Red Sox to a 6 to 2 win over the Cleveland Indians.

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Tilden's Name Dropped From Amateur List

NEW YORK, Aug. 14. (A. P.)—

The list of players in the annual east-west tennis matches has been posted for the world to see, and 19, "Big Bill" Tilden's name does not head the list. As a matter of fact it doesn't appear at all and thereby hangs another tennis mystery.

"Big Bill," now awaiting trial on charges of violating the amateur rule of the United States Lawn Tennis association, has been a familiar figure in east-west matches for years. Many was the duel he fought with "Little Bill" Johnston in this annual series. Now both apparently out of the picture, "Little Bill's" absence is voluntary. He announced his retirement some months ago. But "Big Bill" evidently is off the squad by official decision.

The eastern squad for the matches which will be played this Friday and Saturday at Forest Hills will consist of Richard N. Williams, Philadelphia, captain; Francis T. Hunter, of New Rochelle, N. Y.; Dr. George Kins, Watson Washburn and Telzo Tobal, all of New York; John Van Ryn of Princeton; Gregory Mangin of Newark, and Fritz Mercier of Harrisburg, Pa.

The United States Lawn Tennis association, in announcing the squad, said its members would "include" these eight, leaving a possible loophole for the inclusion of Tilden but few tennis observers believed that the Philadelphia would be named.

O'DONNELL WILL MEET MANDELL; NOT FOR TITLE

CUT WAGES ON ENGLISH ROADS

LONDON, Aug. 14. (A. P.)—A saving in labor costs to railways of England of about \$15,000,000 annually is estimated to be the result of the 2 1/2 per cent cut in salaries and wages which has been ratified by the unions. Brooklyn Fans Ask Discharge of W. Robinson

NEW YORK, Aug. 14. (A. P.)—

Over Brooklyn-way, they're gunning for Wilbert Robinson, portly manager of the Brooklyn Robins for the last 14 years.

A well-developed move to oust Robinson from the pilot-seat at the end of the 1929 season when his contract expires, is under way and behind the move, according to reliable authority, is Stephen W. McKeever, vice president and treasurer of the club.

McKeever says his effort to remove Robinson is being made as a result of a deluge of letters from Brooklyn fans protesting against Uncle Wilbert's handling of the Robins this year. After starting out the season in winning fashion, the Robins began dropping down the ladder until they now stand sixth in the national league standing and with little hope of ending the campaign in any higher position.

Robinson holds a \$15,000 contract to manage the Robins in 1929. As club president-manager, this year, he receives a salary of \$25,000.
