THREE BURNED IN NIGHT FIRE

Renger, sprained wrist and bruises.

The fatalities resulted from suffocation. Members of the Redwood City fire department worked over the three bodies at the scene of the fire in an attempt to revive them.

Chimney Defect Origin.

The fire, which broke out at 3 a. m., may have resulted from a chimney defect as the family last night burned a large mass

of papers in a fireplace, preparatory to returning to their San Francisco home today.

Koff received his injuries when he leaped through a pane of glass. Within the dwelling were his wife, two sons and other household members.

Miss Movissette and Mrs. Renger followed Koff's example and saved themselves by leaping from the top floor of the two-story house. A boy was reported to have dashed into the burning house and rescued the infant son. Firemen who arrived carried off the unconscious forms of Mrs. Koff, her son and Miss Heyman, but they could not be resuscitated.

Overcome By Smoke.

From the position of the bodies, the three had tried to escape but had been overcome by the smoke that poured up from the first floor.

The home was owned by the pastor of the Redwood City Congregational church, Rev. R. J. Currie. He was to have moved into the dwelling today. Firemen confined the flames to the lower floor.
