YANKEES LOSE BUT ATHLETICS ALSO SET BACK

Mackmen Again Lose Great Chance to Cut Down Lead

Some small part of the tension has been removed from the National league race, for the moment at least, by a St. Louis victory and a New York defeat, but the American league quartet persists in remaining in the state it reached ten days ago, when the Athletics came to the peak of their spurt in the west.

While the Cardinals were increasing their lead over the Giants to three and one-half games yesterday, the Mackmen were refusing to reduce the Yankee margin to the same figure. The champions dropped their second straight to the White Sox, but the Mackmen similarly exposed their chins to the Tigers for the second time in as many days.

The latest Yankee reverse, decorated with Babe Ruth's forty-fifth 1928 home run, was due chiefly to the antics of Urban Faber, the ancient spit-baller who for fifteen years has been a particular nuisance to Ruth and the Yankees. Old Urban received gleaming support from Johnny Mostil and Chalmers Clesell as he won by 3 to 4, but he could have slipped by with much worse backing.

Little was wrong with the Athletics pitching served up by the ancient John Ples Quinn, but the Mackmen themselves thought Sam Gibson and George Smith were terrible. Quinn held the Detroit enemy to three earned runs, but the home boys were unable to get more than three, earned or otherwise, from the offerings of Messrs. Gibson and Smith. The final reckoning was 6 to 3 in favor of the Tigers.

Cleveland won by 7 to 0 behind the fine pitching of Joe Shute in Boston, while Garland Braxton hurled the Senators to a 4 to 3 decision over Sam Gray and the Browns.

The Wrigley field flax pursued the Giants again, but Chicago base hits may just possibly have had something to do with the ninth-inning defeat of the clan McGraw by 6 to 6.

The Cardinal victory over the Braves by 7 to 3 was acceptable enough to St. Louisans at its face value, but more acceptable as a sign that the Red Bird slump had ended. Beest off by indifferent pitching, the Cardinals got an excellent brand from Willis Shogder, and backed it up with twelve solid hits.

Three of the twelve were gathered by Sunny Jim Bottomley, who celebrated the end of his own personal batting slump with a home run.

Cincinnati turned the tables on Philadelphia, winning by 11 to 4, while Brooklyn smashed its losing streak, stopping the Pirates in a nip-and-tuck game by 6 to 5.

ILLINOIS GRID CHANCES GOOD, 15 LETTER MEN

Seven Conference Coaches Faced With Weak Outlook for Season

CHICAGO, August 16. (UP)—Their teams weakened by the loss of stars who finished their college careers last year, at least seven coaches must look to their sophomore material to develop gridiron teams that will be outstanding in the race for the 1928 Big Ten conference football title.

The three schools that will be favored with a strong nucleus of last year's varsity men are Illinois, Wisconsin and Iowa, a survey of the conference material today showed.

Illinois, last year's champions, presents the most formidable eleven among the conference schools and may hold the hopes of the middlewest for the national football title in view of the fact that Notre Dame, a non-conference school, faces a serious development problem if they intend to conquer the east and west.

Coach Bob Zuppke will have

15 letter men of last season reporting on September 15 when the hundreds of gridiron hopefuls will trot out for inspection and training before the various conference coaches. In addition, the most likely bunch of sophomores in years will vie for positions on the Illini varsity this year.

Wisconsin hopes to be the real threat against Illinois' title hopes this year. In addition to having 17 letter men back, Coach Thistlewaite shares the good fortune of Zuppke in having several graduates from last year's freshman team that performed in impressive manner.

Seventeen veterans, five minor letter men and 32 members of last year's freshman squad will be back in uniform at Iowa University, to make them stand out as a dangerous title contender this year. Mayes McClain, Indian fullback, undoubtedly will be the outstanding addition to the squad. When With Haskell, Coach Knute Rockne of Notre Dame, classed McClain as one of the best fullbacks in the United States. The Indian played on the Iowa "troop" squad in 1927.

Chicago hopes to have a superior team to that of last year when the maroon broke even in their conference schedule. The 1928 improvement will come from a more versatile and finished backfield but Coach Stagg suffered a big loss of strength in the line.
