EXPLOSION IN MINE TRAPS 10

Dust Detonation Causes Tragedy in Pennsylvania

COALPORT, Pa., Aug. 16, (U.P.)—Ten men are reported to be entombed in the No. 3 mine of the Irwin Coal company, at Irwin, near here by an explosion in the workings late yesterday. Three men were taken from the mine shortly after the explosion occurred. One of the men, John Collins, is burned so seriously that he is expected to die. The other two rescued are Thos. Stoddard and Walter Gardner. A dust explosion occurred in the third south section of the mine, about three miles from the drift mouth, at a time when the day and night forces were changing. About 175 men work in the mine at a time. Rescue squads were sent to the scene from nearby mining communities. The bureau of mines rescuer, with a squad of eight men, has been despatched from Pittsburgh. The fans in the mine are still operating and fresh air is being forced in.

ROLLING ROCK CRUSHES YOUTH

SALT LAKE CITY, Aug. 16, (AP)—Willard Young Kimball, 11, son of Edward P. Kimball, president of the Salt Lake Rotary club was killed and three other persons were slightly injured last night when a boulder weighing about 300 pounds crashed down a mountain side and bounded into a group of Rotarians on an annual picnic at Rotary grove north of here. The injured are Marion Young Kimball, 16, sister of Willard; L. D. Mortenson and Ted Aldous.

SOUTH IS SAFE FOR AL SMITH

arrival of Senator George, of Georgia, an opponent of Smith for the nomination. A conference tomorrow with Senator Walsh of Montana, who withdrew from the race for the nomination after the California primaries and announced his support of Smith, will wind up the series of confidential discussions with prominent drys that the presidential candidate had personally arranged for the period preceding the notification ceremony.

Stands By Smith.

Daniels asserted the South, as he sized up the situation, would remain solidly Democratic in November despite the fact that some were opposing Smith there on his prohibition stand. He reiterated that he would stand by the ticket "from constable to president" and expressed belief that Smith would be taken at his word when he said he would faithfully enforce the law.

While again expressing regret over Smith's message to the Houston convention declaring for more liberal enforcement laws, Daniels said he did not believe this was repudiation of the Democratic platform which he thought adequately "met the situation."

The Secretary of the Navy under President Wilson dealt opposing reports that those opposing Smith in North Carolina were doing so because of his religion.

Statements Wrong.

"These reports are doing the people of my state a great injustice," he declared. "Some may be opposed to the governor on those grounds, but the great bulk of those opposing him are doing so because they are dry."

He said that undoubtedly much depended upon what Smith said on the 18th amendment and Volstead Act in his speech of acceptance next Wednesday night and predicted that if the address "is not any moister" than the governor's previously expressed views he would carry North Carolina by a hundred thousand majority.

"I think Smith will enforce the law," he said, adding that reports already had reached him from his state of unfavorable re-

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and predicted great crowds would turn out to hear him in Daniels' home city.

GREENWOOD LAKE, N. Y., Aug. 16, (AP)—The Rev. Dr. John Roach Straton has written to Senator George of Georgia and Josephus Daniels, former secretary of the navy, calling on them to repudiate the candidacy of Governor Smith.

up the handling of freight in Klamath Falls which has been somewhat handicapped in the past," said the railroad superintendent. "Particularly is this true with regard to handling of heavy mill machinery."

"Work will be started within the next few weeks on the improvement and will be completed by this fall. The contract has not been let."

The Southern Pacific and the Great Northern each purchased a tract of land 200 feet in width between south sixth street and the Strahorn tracks. The Great Northern's freight and passenger station and terminal tracks were located on its property while, to date, the Southern Pacific has not developed its land.

Although no figure was mentioned by the railroad official, it is understood that the improvement will entail an investment of \$100,000.

FLOOD DAMAGE BIG IN SOUTH

to care for hundreds of refugees from the French broad river valley, where the French dam was threatening to collapse.

Mill Cities Marooned.

Many mill communities along the Pacolet river were threatened, with Tryon, N. C., already feeling the rush of flood waters unleashed when Clifton Textile mill dam No. 2 went out last night.

The suburban mill communities of Beaumont and Arkwright at Spartanburg were flooded for the second time within a week and Spartanburg was without gas. Anderson mill bridge on Tiger river was swept away.

A freakish tornado tore up 50 houses at Bath, S. C. yesterday and injured one woman. A score of houses were damaged or destroyed by a similar storm at Newberry, but no casualties were reported. Charleston also reported heavy damage from the storm and high water.

In Georgia, Quitman appeared the worse hit, having been isolated by flood water released by the collapse of two dams on Okaplico creek. Brice dam, impounding a 17,000 acre lake and Melton dam, holding 500 acres of impounded water collapsed yesterday.

No Water.

Milledgeville, Ga., was without drinking water and was isolated. Macon had but one rail line open, and reported the Okmulgee river two feet over flood stage, with another four foot rise expected today. More than 15 inches of rain fell there in the last few weeks, one third normal annual precipitation.

Meanwhile, with Quitman itself on high ground, the waters of Okaplico creek were joining the already swollen Withlacoochee river, which in turn was threatening several northwestern Florida resort towns.

Rail and highway travel throughout the affected area was

practically at a standstill, with many roads making heavy efforts to rescue stranded trains and operate by detours. The Southern in the Asheville territory was the last to capitulate last night, but 16 landslides on two divisions forced a halt.

Deputies were placed along main highways around Asheville to warn tourists that all roads were washed out at dangerous points.

One passenger train was reported stranded near Compobello, S. C., while two filled buses were held up near Bata cave in the same state.
