WARDEN PLANS TO VISIT BIG MARSH COUNTRY

Another inspection of the Big Marsh country where small "flapper" ducks, yet unable to fly, are reported to be dying, will be made Sunday by Marion J. Barnes, district game warden, tomorrow.

Barnes and United States Game Warden Ray Steele of Portland spent two days in the district and reported a large section of the marsh area dry and many of the young ducks dying from lack of water or eaten by coyotes.

FIRE IS NOT UNDER CONTROL

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of the Telford-Reed timber causing some damage.

Columns of smoke mounting skyward today told developments of the second day of the Hog Back mountain fire—namely that the conflagration is not yet under control.

However, authorities of the Klamath Forest Protective association believed that the blaze would be checked tonight or tomorrow before it did serious damage to timber north-east and north of the mountain.

Throughout the night, a wide fire trail was dragged between the fire and the timber, which it was hoped, would block the advance of the flames. Fire fighters also back-fired. A large part of the flames and smoke today originated from small trees and brush between the main fire and the back-fire. It was said.

Timber Damaged.

The conflagration burned through approximately 40 acres of the Larkey Logging company timber and damaged about 50,000 feet of felled logs which were piled up ready to be moved. Up to noon today, the Telford-Reed Lumber company timber, which was threatened had not been damaged. Grain which had been cut but not threshed on the P. C. Carlson ranch suffered considerable damage, it was reported.

The fire broke out yesterday morning at the bottom of the west slope of Hog Back Mountain. Fanned by a brisk breeze, the flames quickly climbed to the crest of the mountain and down on the other side. Late yesterday afternoon the wind switched to the north and the fire moved south along the high ridges six miles to the fringe of the Pine Grove district, near Olene.

During the night, fire fighters took advantage of the lower humidity to drag fire trails and to back-fire. There was constant danger that flying embers blown into the standing timber would cause a fire to break out at the backs of the fire fighters.

Origin Undetermined

Origin of the blaze had not been determined, but there was a report current that two youths had camped at the base of Hog Back mountain and failed to put out their camp fire. The report had not been confirmed up to late this afternoon.

Efforts of employees of the Larkey Logging company and the Telford-Reed Lumber company were largely responsible for holding the flames in check yesterday.

The blaze was reminiscent of the Keno and Worden forest fires to the west of Klamath Falls several years ago.

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Aug. 17. (AP)—An incendiary forest fire about one mile west of Bangor, a suburb of North Bend, was out of control today. It had covered from 25 to 30 acres since late yesterday. The Coon Bay fire patrol called out a dozen men to fight the fire. The flames were not endangering residences.

EXECUTION OF WOMAN UPHELD BY HIGH COURT

ATLANTA, Ga., Aug. 17. (UP)—The Georgia State supreme court affirmed a sentence of death in the electric chair today for Mrs. Rula Elrod Thompson, convicted of the murder of Coleman Osborne, Chatsworth, Ga., storekeeper, last year.

Mrs. Thompson's husband, Clifford, and a negro, Jim Moss, were electrocuted at the state prison August 5 for the murder, but Mrs. Thompson gained a longer lease on life by appealing to the supreme court.

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
