GIANTS WALLOP ST. LOUIS IN FIRST MEETING

New York Team Takes Measure of Spittaller in Clash

The Giants were unable to withstand the force of their Wrigley Field jinx in Chicago, but as soon as they set foot in St. Louis, they proceeded to demolish another evil influence equally potent. Until reduced to an unrecognizable hulk by a shameful assault yesterday, the venerable Clarence Mitchell, long famed as the only left-handed spitballer in captivity, had been able to throttle the clan McGraw merely by having his name announced as the pitcher.

The turning point came yesterday when the New Yorkers shaded the veteran by 3 to 2 in a game which seemed as if it should have ended about 10 to 2.

McGraw Bunch Elated.

McGraw's initial success in the three-game series against the Cardinals were locked in pennant strife, the Pirates registered a gain of a game and a half on the Cubs and a half game on the Reds in the third-plate battle. Reds Beat Braves.

The Reds shaded the Braves by 2 to 1 and the Robins did the same thing to the Cubs by 1 to 0 in magnificent pitchers' battles played chiefly for exercise. Eppa Rixey and Doug McWeeny were the winners, with Kent Greenfield and Sheritt Blake on the losing end.

Rain in New York and Philadelphia halted the great battle between the Athletics and the Yankees to see how long they can maintain the present standing of the American League clubs, with the Yanks, of course, retaining their edge of four and a half games. Action in this sector was confined to minor engagements which saw Boston stop Chicago by 4 to 3 in eleven innings and Washington nose out Detroit by 3 to 1.

Colima Beats Famous Champ of Australia

HOLLYWOOD, Aug. 18. (UP)

Bert Colima, claimant to the Pacific coast middleweight title, took a ten-round decision from Roy Moore, champion of Australia in the middleweight, light-weight and heavyweight divisions. It was a furious battle, but Moore was able to collect only three rounds and an even break in a fourth.

Colima made his first appearance since being suspended by the state boxing commission for fouling. Oakland Johnny Burns defeated Eddie Gill in their six-round go. Sammy Asaire, Mexican, scored two knockdowns and won all six rounds from Phil Harris.

George Stallings, the "miracle manager" of the 1914 Boston Braves, was a great believer in the superiority of gray-eyed, blonde ball players. Although Stallings himself was dark and brown-eyed, he didn't warm up to brunette ball players. Whenever a scout touted a young ball player to George, he would always ask about the color

LEFT HOOK TO BODY LAYS OUT N. Y. FIGHTER

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 18. (U. P.)—The surprise he kept to himself for four rounds, a powerful left hook to the stomach, gave Young Corbett, Fresno welterweight, a knockout victory over Nick Testa of Troy, New York, in the fifth round of a scheduled 10-round bout here tonight.

Corbett made the easterner double up and sink to the canvas with the poke that came shortly after the round started and the fans were still crying for action that had been missing in the earlier frames. Testa tried to rise at the count of 10 but only reached one knee.

The boxers both were of the defensive type and clinched throughout the first four rounds, waiting for an opening which Corbett was first to discover.

Dix Jabs Way to Fight Win

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Aug. 18. (AP)—Madison Dix, 140-pound scrapper from Bellingham, won a decision in a six-round main event on an all-star card here last night, beating Bobby James of Seattle.

James, weighing 152 pounds, held the weight advantage but was unable to make it count, Dix winning all the way.

In the semi-final Sailor Jimmy Ryan of Walla Walla earned a draw after six rounds with Al Thompson of Seattle. Both tipped the scales at 158 pounds.

In a six-round special event, Del Allen, La Grande, Ore., won his fight with Billy Kennedy, 156, Tacoma boxer, when the referee stopped the battle in the fourth round. Kennedy was bleeding profusely but was not badly hurt.

Jack Kieger, 154-pound mauler from Kennewick, Wash., had it all his own way over Jimmy Kel-

by, 152, Seattle, the coast lad's seconds hurling in the sponge after he had been knocked down twice in the fourth round.

FOREST FIRES COSTLY

Each day several fires are reported by the Forest Protection forces.

Under favorable conditions any one of these may become a conflagration which will destroy thousands of dollars worth of property, the homes of settlers and even human lives.

The Klamath county's forests are not alone her principal commercial mainstay, but also the source of outdoor beauty and enjoyment.

Fishermen and hunters understand that preservation of wild life and inland fisheries begins with protection against fire of forested areas.

All of us wish to pass on to our children a country no less beautiful and productive than we received it.

This can be done by stamping out needless fires. Some fires are not preventable. Machinery for control of such fires is each year being improved, but most of them still result from human carelessness.

Control of forest fires is not the function of any one group. Nor is it alone that of Government, State or private organizations. It is the business of every citizen, man, woman, boy, and girl—for all benefit through existence of our forests.

The way to solve our forest problem is not through use of less lumber, but by protecting existing forests and by growing new ones. New forests will grow if fires are kept from

running over deforested areas. If not destroyed, our mature timber will keep pay rolls alive.

Needless fires—started through human carelessness—comprising 75% of those which each year occur, interfere with local industry, destroy wild life, pollute streams, impair water sheds from which our domestic supplies are drawn, impair water supplies for irrigation purposes, and renders non-productive thousands of acres which might be producing valuable crops.

A little more care on the part of those going into wooded sections will save thousands of dollars worth of taxable property, help maintain our payrolls and preserve the natural beauties of our country.
