CONFLAGRATION STILL SERIOUS

The conflagration. One-half million feet of manufactured lumber was piled in the yard ready to be moved to Klamath Falls. If necessary, the portable mill could have been moved.

Over ten acres of good timber grown, but so far as the protective association authorities could tell, that was the only damage yesterday and this morning to standing timber.

The fire is one of the largest seen in Klamath during recent years. Breaking out Thursday morning it swept up Hog Back mountain to its crest and then down the other side into merchantable timber. Thursday afternoon a north wind carried the flames ten miles south to the fringe of Pine Grove. A stand of wheat on the P. C. Carlson ranch was destroyed during this movement and other farms menaced. One ranch east of Klamath Falls was completely surrounded by flames at one time but, miraculously, was saved from destruction.

Authorities today estimated that the blaze covered an area of 5,000 acres. The fire was ten miles long and three miles in width at the widest point. Owners and employees of the Larkey Logging company and the Telford-Reed Lumber company have worked night and day in conjunction with protective association fighters in a desperate effort to control the blaze.

SAN BERNARDINO, Cal., Aug. 18. (UP)—A force of 150 men last night were waging a losing fight against a forest fire that already had burned over 2,000 acres.

Much watershed land had been rendered black and further watersheds were threatened. Plans were made by Forest Supervisor F. A. Nash-Boulton to send an additional 100 men to the scene of the blaze Saturday. Wind and dry weather added to the hazards of the flames.

The fire started yesterday afternoon 9 miles from San Bernardino and raged on a mile wide front toward the north. Devil Canyon, one of the chief sources of the city water supply, was threatened.

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Aug. 18. (AP)—A brush fire at Bangor, a suburb of North Bend, was under control today. The Coos Bay fire patrol got the upper hand after the wind died down late yesterday. The fire fighters built three miles of trail to control the sweep of the blaze which covered from 500 to 600 acres.

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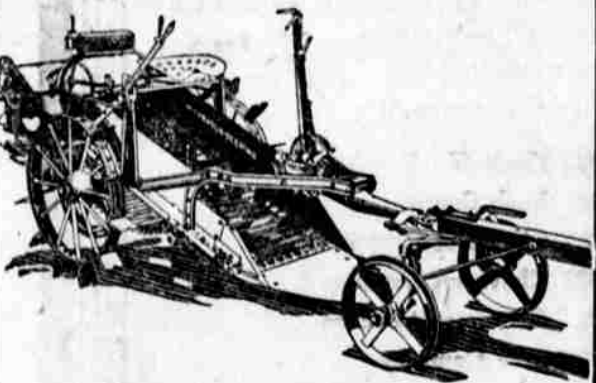
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
