GIANTS CLIMB TO TOP; CARDS LOSE 3D GAME

Cleveland and N. Y. Yankees Divide Double Bill

Pushing over the St. Louis Cardinals yesterday for the third time in a row, the Giants crowded past Bill McKechnie's tottering fighters and for the first time since early in the present campaign could look back and see all their seven rivals behind them.

It scarcely can be said that the Giants have a foothold on the top rung—it's no more than a toe hold and a very insecure one at that. As a matter of fact it's necessary to get out the percentage tables to prove that the clan McGraw really is in the lead. Mathematically the Giants are leading by three percentage points but in games won and lost the Cardinals show the way by half a game.

the American coast and Greenland for more than a month. She last reported that she was Cape Chidley, Labrador.

CHICAGO, Aug. 20. (AP)—Growing anxiety was felt today for the safety of Bert Hassell and Parker Cramer, good will fliers from Rockford, Ill., to Stockholm, Sweden, after more than 30 hours had elapsed since the last radio signals from the aviators had been heard.

The plane was last heard from Sunday morning at 4 a. m., Chicago daylight time, when a Madison, Wis., radio operator intercepted signals sent from the plane then flying from Cochran, Ont., to Mount Evans, Greenland. These signals indicated the fliers at that time were 75 miles off Cape Chidley, flying over Davis Straits and had completed about three-quarters of the 1,600 mile trip from Rockford to Mt. Evans.

As hours continued to pass without any word from the aviators, the most optimistic ventured the opinion that the Rockford fliers had reached Greenland and made a forced landing in which event days might elapse before they made their way to some point to communicate with the outside world.

The fliers in their big monoplane, Greater Rockford, left Rockford Thursday, making the hop to Cochran without incident and started the second leg Saturday noon after which there were infrequent signals from the plane until Sunday morning.

Hassell's wife and three children at Rockford anxiously awaited some word of the aviators' fate but Mrs. Hassell insisted she was certain that her husband had reached Greenland. "Planes that fly as long as his don't stop suddenly," she declared.

Approach Shot Goes Through 6-Inch Opening

"The most accurate shot I ever made," said Larry Nabholz, "was at the Inwood course, Long Island, in 1923, while trying to qualify for the National Open Championship. Coming to the eighth hole, a 220 yard affair, I had pulled my ball to the left in a bunch of trees and it was necessary for me to do some tall playing to get out.

"I was fifty-five yards from the flag. In front of me was a cluster of trees. My lie was in the deep rough. What was to be done?

"Making a careful examination, I discovered that a narrow opening between the two trees gave a direct line to the flag. But the pathway between the trees was no more than six inches in width—so narrow, in fact, that I could see nothing on the green.

"I would have to play a ball neither too high nor too low. The former kind would catch the branches of the trees and the latter would not get out of the rough. I took my masher and using the most careful aim possible, let go. The ball sailed between the trees, came down on the green and dribbled into the cup for a two.

"It was the most accurate play I ever made. Of course, holing out was luck, but hitting the ball through that skinny opening was a bit more than good fortune.

Freight moving on the present line haul via Ogden and Roseville would be diverted over a cross state line which the state public service commission wants to have built. He said he believed that the 387 carloads of Russell moving through the Portland gateway from southern Oregon would have to come this way because of better refrigeration and quicker train movement.

On this point Wm. C. McCulloch, attorney for the public service commission asked whether the same standard of refrigeration and service would be expected on the cross-state line as on the present lines over which such products are moving.
