GIANTS' TEAM STRENGTHENED BY NEW FACES

Boston Braves Supply Main Cogs; Yankees Gain a Half Game

If John McGraw wins his 11th National League pennant this year, the Boston Braves, themselves assured of finishing no higher than seventh, can take a good share of the credit.

Some of the most important cogs in the New York Giant's machine came under McGraw's control after an apprenticeship at Boston. Without Larry Benton, Frank Hogan, Joe Genewich, Jim Walsh and Les Mann, it's a bit difficult to believe that McGraw, great manager though he is, could drive the Giants into the leadership of a league boasting as many strong aggregations as does the National this year. All five of these regulars or semi-regulars made the trip from Boston to New York during the past year or so.

Ex-Boston Players Help

After Boston had pitched the Giants into first place at St. Louis Sunday, Genewich enabled them to remain there yesterday at Cincinnati where he turned back the Reds, 5 to 3.

Noising out the Brooklyn Dodgers, 2 to 1; the St. Louis Cardinals gained fractionally on the Giants whose lead dwindled to two percentage points despite their victory at Cincinnati. Dazzy Vance, who had won seven straight games, was the victim of a ninth inning rally.

The Phils pounded four Cub pitchers for 18 hits and an 11 to 6 victory at Chicago. Four home runs were smashed out, one of them being Hack Wilson's 28th homer of the year.

Hornsby Wins Slugfest

The Braves and Pirates battled for nearly three hours before Hornsby's crew beat the Corsairs 14 to 11 in a slugfest in which 36 safe hits were recorded by the scorers, 19 of them going to the Pirates. Burrell Grimes, ace of the Pittsburgh staff, was batted out of the box in the fifth inning.

In the American League, the idle New York Yankees added another half game to their lead over Philadelphia when the Athletics bowed to the St. Louis Browns, 2 to 1. Howard Ehmke and Joe Bush were batted for 18 hits. Mannish and O'Rourke getting four apiece. Meanwhile Jack Ogden was setting the A's down with four safeties. The A's now trail the Yankees by five and a half games.

Red Faber granted the Red Sox only six hits and the Chicago White Sox trimmed Boston, 6 to 4. Walter Shires, 20-year-old recruit first baseman, started on the offensive for the White Sox, getting four hits including a triple.

SUSPEND HACK WILSON 3 DAYS

NEW YORK, Aug. 21. (AP)—Hack Wilson, the Chicago outfielder and National League home run leader, has been suspended for three days "for an outburst against the umpires yesterday." John Heydler, league president, announced today. Perce Malone, Cub pitcher, drew a \$50 fine for using "abusive language from the bench." Wilson objected to a strike called by Umpire Pfirman yesterday as the Phillies were trimming the Cubs 11 to 6.

McGraw Buys BACK PITCHER

CINCINNATI, Aug. 21. (AP)—John McGraw today announced the re-purchase by the New York Giants of the veteran right-hander, Jack Scott, from the Toledo club of the American Association for Bill Walker and an unannounced cash consideration. Walker is a young southpaw recruited from Denver last fall. Scott always was a good "money pitcher," and McGraw desired his experience as an aid to the Giants in their stretch drive, he said.

Scott's official baseball age is thirty-four, though he is sometimes suspected of being older.

It seems the property owners petitioned for the lights on a five year bond plan to pay for installation of the fancy standards. Payment of the electric current was treated more or less lightly at the time, some claiming it was understood that property owners were to pay for the current until the city could work out a plan by which that expense would be taken care of as a municipality. Mayor Walters does not agree with this statement. He said the mere erection of light standards meant nothing unless current was furnished to light the streets and the district. The city therefore perfected a plan where for ten years property owners in the district would pay the current cost.
