

Fighters Await Bell At Vets Arena

BATTLERS WILL CLASH IN FAST BOUTS TONIGHT

Statements Given Out by Main Eventers on Eve of Mix

In what promises to be one of the greatest fight cards ever staged in Klamath Falls, Phil Hayes of Salem will meet Johnnie Francis of San Francisco in one ten round main event and Karin O'Carroll of San Francisco will cross gloves with Gene O'Grady of Ashland in the Vets arena on the corner of Sixth and Klamath avenue tonight. The first preliminary starts at 8:45 p. m.

"I want to go over big here," said Hayes whose fine fight record is in an adjacent column of this page. "If I get over Francis, who, I understand is a tough boy, I've been signed by your promoter to meet Benny Pelz, the



Famous little slugger, in a ten round main event on Labor Day. We've met three times before. Once he won, once I won and the last time was a draw."

Hayes is a lightweight and will weigh in at 133 pounds. He is short and wide, and, despite the scars of battle on his face, his talk does not sound like the average pug.

Will Do His Best

"I go on one theory in this fight game," he said. "You've got to produce the goods, or the cash customers won't come again. Whenever I fight, I put everything I've got into it. I'd rather fight a fellow just as good as I am or a little better, than roll over a set-up."

"Yes, I'm confident of winning tonight, principally because I'm in good shape."

Johnnie Francis, the fast little



California fighter who meets Hayes, was equally confident on the eve of battle.

"I'll do my derndest to loop one over on this Salem boy early in the fight," he said. "The quicker I can put over the kayo the better I'll like it."

O'Carroll Confident

Karin O'Carroll who fights Gene O'Grady smiled his way in to the sporting editor's office and announced that he was in fighting trim for the fight of his life.

"I'd like to go over big here," he said. "I rolled out in his typical Irish brogue. 'This is a good fight town it fights are good and on the square and I figure I could do well here if they like me. So, you can tell 'em that I'm after this boy O'Grady just as early as I can stow him away.'"

O'Grady just couldn't wait to get into the ring.

"I'm in good shape; I'll be in there fighting all the time—that's all I've got to say now."

Ticket Sale Jumps

The ticket sale jumped this afternoon indicating a good turnout at the Vets arena. The main eventers rested up today to store up nervous energy for the supreme test tonight.

As for the preliminaries, they look good.

Probably the ace preliminary will be between Harold Wright, undefeated Chilquin Indian, and Mike Carr, by the way, defeated Wild Cat Carter when both were young in the fight game. Carter, however, has since climbed to the heights of pugilistic fame. Wright has had ten fights and won them all. They will weigh 125 pounds at ringside.

Munroe to Fight Poole

Frankie Munroe, the sleek sleek of Chilquin, will meet Dummy Poole, Klamath Falls, in another four round bout. Both weigh 130 pounds.

The first preliminary will be between two Indian fly weights, Chief Briggs and Chief Wilson. The boys will fight at 115 pounds.

HERE ARE RECORDS OF FOUR MAIN EVENTERS

PHIL HAYES.

Phil Hayes, Salem, is a main event attraction in the northwest. His record includes a one-round knockout over Joe Marcus, Portland phenom, and a decisive ten-round decision over Ad Mackie. He has fought Benny Pelz, one of the greatest little sluggers in the game. Hayes lost the first decision, won the second and on the third clash, they drew. He fought Benny Dotson recently for a ten-round draw. (Dotson was a main event attraction in Klamath for several months, and since leaving here, has gone far in the fight world. Hayes also has wins to his credit over Chuck Hellman, Kewpie Riley and Battling Bulahan. He fights at 133 pounds and will meet Johnny Francis in one of the two ten-round main events at the Vets arena, Sixth and Klamath avenue.

JOHNNIE FRANCIS.

Johnnie Francis, San Francisco, 133 pounds, who meets Hayes tonight, has defeated such boys as Sam Offerman, Tommy Cello and Jack Davis. He fought the sensational Jack Silver and drew with this coming fighter. Francis is noted for his knockout punch and his quickness to take

advantage of the slightest advantage of his opponent.

GENE O'GRADY.

Gene O'Grady, Ashland, weight 165 pounds, is one of the coming fighters in his division. He has had 18 fights, and has yet to taste defeat. Five of his fights went to a draw; he won 13. The Irishman is a fast and heady fighter. He will meet Karin O'Carroll in the second main event of the fight card tonight.

KARIN O'CARROLL.

Karin O'Carroll, San Francisco, is perhaps the most colorful fighter who will step through the ropes tonight. He weighs 165 pounds, has been fighting three years and is recognized as one of the comers in his class. He has beaten boys of the class of Walker Rich and Carl Sepulveda. He fought two fights with Lou Rollinger losing a close decision on the first clash and winning a hard fought draw the second. Once he was on the receiving end of a knockout blow when Chuck Wiggins, one of the fastest middleweight fighters in the west, stowed him away in the eighth. O'Carroll had broken his hand in the fourth round but refused to give up despite this handicap.

Tunney Visits Home of Irish Ancestors; Given Big Welcome

DUBLIN, Aug. 24. (AP)—Gene Tunney today was in the land of his ancestors and he was accorded a welcome greater than any king ever has received at the hands of the Irish.

Notwithstanding a typical Irish downpour, thousands of persons waited on the streets to welcome and cheer the ex-champion boxer.

When the steamer from Holyhead arrived at Kingstown, nobody was permitted to land until the reception committee, which included John McCormack, the tenor; Major Fitzmaurice, transatlantic flyer, and General O'Duffy, chief of police, had gone aboard to wish the visitor. "Glad Millie Fafite"—an hundred thousand welcomes.

Gene landed amidst the strains rendered by a band of pipers, and entered one of a fleet of decorated motorcars displaying the Stars and Stripes and the Irish tricolor.

Despite his expressed hope to be allowed to enter the city quietly, the people insisted upon their hero worship and Tunney's drive to Dublin was a triumphal procession with the greatest of excitement manifest everywhere. The car had to push its way through dense packs of cheering people to the Gresham hotel, where the former champion is staying.

Hardly had Gene entered the hotel when he received an invitation from President Cosgrave to visit him at the Government Building. Tunney promptly responded and was received cordially by Mr. Cosgrave and his cabinet ministers. He then was presented to the council of the Gaelic games teams, which gave a banquet in his honor. He will visit the games today and present prizes to the winners Saturday.

Interviewed upon his arrival at the hotel, Gene said: "I never before have had such a welcome. Look at those thousands out there in the rain. All they can hope for from me is a glance."

eyebrows and bristling van dyke beard and hopes that the world will at least make a bow toward him as the originator of its newest popular marvel.

Lauste has been missing success by the breadth of one of his whiskers all his life. When he was 25 years old he was working with Edison in the famous "Room 5" at West Orange, from which came the peep show and finally projected pictures that flickered on a screen.

Thirty-four years ago he had left Edison and was with the Lathams, working night and day in a small room beneath the Manhattan end of the Brooklyn bridge, building their pontopikon. Later he went to the Biograph company. His entire adult life has been wrapped up in the bright dream that finally made staying at home of evenings unnecessary.

"All the time I was working on my idea of photographing sound as well as objects," he said.

"In 1906 I finished my machine and took it to England when I went over there in the employ of the Biograph company. It was widely acclaimed and I had it patented."

Lauste has the official record on a master patent taken out in

Great Britain in 1906, but not renewed in recent years.

Lauste stroked the pages of a worn scrap book as he talked. They bore printed appreciations of his work from motion picture weeklies and monthlies, the Scientific American, the London Illustrated News and Daily Express, some dated 1907 hall his "photo-cinophone" as the "marvel of tomorrow." One brief technical paper refers to him as "the grand old man of the talking movies," but this one adds that the actual working out of his plan had been crude and "only a dozen men in the country know that he is the forerunner of the latest craze in motion picture production."

"I eventually had a company formed," said Lauste. "Most of the stockholders were German. When the war came, the company went to pieces. I came back to America and this country joined the war, too."

The inventor managed to convey the patience with which he waited for the world to stop interfering with his plans. "I knew very few persons in America when I came back. My machine needed money. I took a young man into partnership and he took the \$5,000 that we had collected to put over my invention."

The old man paused. "And then I suddenly heard that De Forest and Western Electric had put a sensation on the market—the talking movies. Somehow it sprang into success without warning. I didn't dream that the machine I had not had the time and money to perfect over here would be called somebody else's invention—and 35 years of my life would be wasted."

"Now, even parts of my machine have been taken away by my partner to pay for his debts. But what surprised me was that with an invention like mine which without doubt will revolutionize the world—I could not interest anybody when I invented it."
