DETAILS TOLD OF NEW TOWN

traveled throughout Washington, Oregon and California, looking for a new location.

He could find none as satisfactory as southern Oregon and so far has purchased over 4000 acres of timber surrounding the site of the new mill, which is planned to be one of the most complete in the state. He expects to purchase more acreage and later establish a box factory, either at the new mill town, which will be called Lincoln, or at Ashland. However, his plans on this matter, so far, are vague and at the present the construction of the mill is his main work.

Build New Town.
The new town, which is plan-

ned to have a church, postoffice, a moving picture show, a school, service station, lodging house, dining room and stores, will be made one of the ideal beauty spots in the state, according to H. E. Tabor of Pasadena, general contractor, who is in complete charge of the building program. The main buildings will be on the south side of the road and 15 bungalows, equipped with hot and cold running water and electricity generated from a power plant with a 2500-foot penstock, using water from Keno creek, a short distance away.

Mr. Tabor, who worked for Mr. Henry in New Hampshire in planning mills and the town of Lincoln, which has now grown fairly large in that state, after having been established by Mr. Henry, arrived at the Greenspring site five weeks ago and ever since has been actively engaged in laying out the site planning buildings, doing his own engineering work and his own surveying.

Cut 50,000 Feet a Day.

The mill proper will use a seven-foot band saw and will be capable of cutting 50,000 feet of lumber a day easily. The building will be 38 feet wide and 150 feet long and a machine shop of 30x40 feet attached, in addition to a boiler room, generating steam power for the mill machinery, all of which will be new equipment. The green chain, on which freshly cut lumber is pulled from the mill to the loading racks, will be housed in a building 32 feet wide and 100 feet long. An up-to-date planing mill and lathe mill will also be located in the main building. The latter mill is being installed to utilize all usable material and eliminate as much waste as possible.

Build Railroad.

A standard gauge railroad will be built from the mill back into Mr. Henry's holdings and will include approximately six miles of trackage, according to present plans outlined yesterday afternoon by Mr. Tabor, who also surveyed the route of the new logging road. A locomotive and a number of flat cars will be purchased entirely new for use in connection with this department of Mr. Henry's program, which also calls for the installation of a complete water system.

The water will be piped for one

mile from a spring, giving a flow of water sufficient to fill a five-inch pipe. This water will be used for domestic purposes and also for the mill pond, which will be capable of floating 500,000 feet of logs. It will be six feet deep, 200 feet wide and 500 feet long. By Mr. Henry, the water is declared to be the coldest and best he has ever tasted, causing him to chuckle yesterday upon remarking that "ice water" will be used to fill the pond.

25 Men at Work.

At the present time, according to Mr. Tabor, 25 men are engaged in the construction and have been working for the past two weeks. The foundations for the store and office building, with dimensions of 30 by 20 feet, and for the dining room, with dimensions of 24 by 40 feet, have been completed. The foundations are made of stone and cement and are in keeping with Mr. Henry's plan of making possible one of southern Oregon's most attractive beauty spots.
