Submarines in the Desert

IN the Coachella Valley of California, the farmer's wife is finding the months from May to September less trying since she has adopted the "desert submarine" for sleeping quarters, and for shelter during midday for certain of her household tasks.

In former years the date farmers in that valley accepted it as inevitable that their wives and children should go to the mountains or the seashore, while they remained through a temperature of 115 and 122 in the shade from 11 o'clock in the morning to four o'clock in the afternoon.

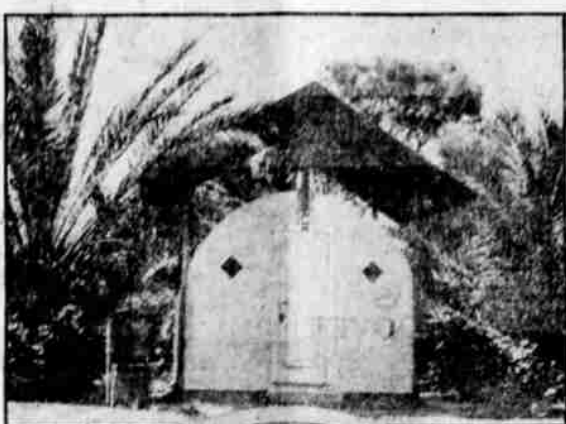
The invention of the "desert submarine" makes it possible for all of the family to remain through the summer in comfort. The name "submarine" comes from the fact that the sheet-steel structure with canton flannel covering is constantly "under water," from a perforated pipe along the top of the roof.

The hot, dry air immediately drips up the moisture as fast as the spray reaches the cloth cover. This instantaneous evaporation produces the same results as the ammonia pipes in a refrigerating plant.

THE interior of the compartment is always 40 to 50 degrees cooler than the air outside. No moisture to induce rheumatism reaches the occupant.

One farmer who predicted many kinds of diseases for the users of the "submarines" slipped a steel bar into the compartment of a neighbor. A year later he told his neighbor where he had hidden this bit of polished steel, which was as bright as the day it was hidden.

Many women on Coachella date farms have fitted their "submarines" with folding beds which become a part of the wall in the daytime, and they keep cool here while doing book-keeping.

The submarine was invented by a railroad engineer who felt the need for adequate sleep during the days spent at Indian railroad division headquarters in the Coachella Valley.

The invention won instant adoption by other railroad men whose steady nerves are essential to the safety of transcontinental passengers. From the railroad club grounds, the submarine has spread its cooling shelter throughout the sun-baked farming community.
