Born in New York 55 years ago, Howard became associated with the theater at an early age, eventually becoming leading man to Ethel Barrymore in one of her earliest successes, "Captain Jack" and later plays. He was also a leading man for Mrs. Lee Carter in "Du Barry," and played next to Blanche Walsh in "A Straight Road" and other productions.

## QUICK ACTION SENDS ROBBER TO STATE PEN

## EIGHT PLANES OFF ON SEARCH

CURTIS FIELD, Aug. 29. (A. P.)—Eight commercial planes from this field and three army ships from Mitchell Field took the air early today to search the country between here and Hibernia, N. Y., for M. M. Merrill and E. M. Rouse, missing since Monday night on an attempted flight from Buffalo.

The planes were the advance guard of what is expected to be the greatest concentration ever made of airplanes on such a mission. Between thirty and forty ships will have left the field by noon, if plans carry through.

## MURDERER OF FARM FOREMAN ADMITS CRIME

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 29. (U. P.)—Mystery surrounding the death of M. C. Ramsey, 69, colored foreman of the Tom Johnson ranch near Yaakton, whose mutilated body was found yesterday, was cleared up today with the capture and confession of Taylor White, sought in connection with the case.

White was captured at Pocatello, Idaho, and readily confessed the murder of the aged ranch foreman, according to word received here by police.

White, a former employe of the ranch, told Idaho authorities that he struck the first blow which felled Ramsey. Ramsey's body was found in a creek on the Johnson ranch.
