MACKMEN PARE DOWN LEAD OF YANKEE STARS

Gain Half a Game by Winning While N. Y. Is Idle Yesterday

The Athletics persist at their task of blasting away the remnants of that Yankee lead, once so handsome, but National league contenders are coming upon rocky paths. The rampant Mackmen found themselves only two and one half games behind the idle Yankees, while the Cardinals, trained out in Chicago, heard tidings of defeat for two of their challengers—the Pirates and the Giants.

The men of McKechnie led by a neat five and one half games over Chicago as they moved into Pittsburgh today for the start of a crucial series—of which the National league will see many in the coming fortnight if not the next four weeks. The Pirates' threat at this moment is the most serious the Cardinals face. They must put it down by at least the odd game in seven to be played in the next two weeks, or face the threat of disaster.

Near Big Series
As the National league situation works its way toward a possible solution in games involving the western contenders against one another, the Yankees and the A's set sail through soft schedules leading up to their big series against each other on the banks of the Harlem just before mid-September.

In other American league engagements, the Browns made it four straight over the Red Sox winning by 4 to 3, and the Indians slammed the ambitious Tigers, 9 to 6. George Burns got two homers, and Marty McManus one.

Trammies Beaten
Ben Cantwell, traded to Boston in the Genevick deal, came back to the Polo grounds to lead other former Giants in making it three straight over the home boys, 8 to 2. The clan McGraw won home run honors on circuit drives by Lindstrom and Jackson, but was in the race for the decision at no time after the third round which witnessed a brutal assault upon Vic Aldridge and Fred Fitzsimmons for five runs.

The defeat was the seventh straight for the Giants, and their ninth in their last ten games. It dropped them a fraction of a point behind the Cubs who moved up into second place by half a game without playing. The clan McGraw, too, is in a virtual tie with the Reds, also idle yesterday.

Even though shut-out by the Phillies by 4 to 0 at Pittsburgh yesterday, the Pirates are only half a game behind the Giants and the Reds, one full contest worse than the Cubs, and six and one-half to the rear of the Cards. If the seven imminent Pittsburgh-St. Louis games are important to the Cards, they are vital to the Buccaneers. The Cards need four out of seven, the Pirate crew must clean up almost all of them to get anywhere.

Walker Matches In 1923 Full of Big Thrills

The "Walker Cup" matches starting tomorrow at the Chicago Golf club remind me of some golf history that Francis Ouimet made in the cup matches in 1893.

"Jess Sweetser and I were pitted against Cyril Tolley and R. De Montmorency in a two ball match," Ouimet says, "and found ourselves on the fifteenth two up."

"The fifteenth at Rye calls for a drive and a midiron second shot. The Britishers were on the green in two, but I started off with a very poor tee shot and Jess on the second shot put the ball in a very deep trap, sixty yards off the hole. An explosion shot was needed and a perfect one at that. Getting to the green would be a miracle.

"Well, if you believe me, I hit the ball in some way—that not only got it out of the trap, but rolled to within three feet of the hole. Tolley and DeMontmorency took three putts for a five while Sweetser sank our putt for a par four. We finally won the match 3 and 1.

"But certainly that occasion was scarcely more exciting than the finish of my match with Roger Wethered in the battle of 1923 for the Walker Cup."

"Wethered had me one down on the 18th, and we both had reached the green in two, Roger about 25 feet from the cup and I about 12, and then he laid me a stymie on his first putt."

"There was a suspicion of a roll in the green, which if I could catch it might carry my ball around Wethered's. A huge sigh went up from the gallery of 10,000. Then it sneaked off to the side, drifted around the stymie and fairly crawled into the hole for a birdie three, and a tie, which amounted to a win."

Clever Little Scot Defeats U. S. Slugger

LONDON, August 30, (UP)—Johnny Hill, Scotland, defeated Newboy Brown of California on points in a 15-round bout last night at Clapton Stadium advertised for the world's flyweight championship. English writers insist that Hill is now the 112-pound champion as Brown was the hitherto titleholder despite the claims of Corporal Izzy Schwartz of New York.

Schwartz is recognized as champion by the New York State Athletic commission.

Sammy Frack, United States, was disqualified for hitting low in the seventh round of his scheduled 15-round bout with Johnny Curley, London.

Teddy Baldock knocked out Johnny Brown, in the second round of their scheduled 15-round bout advertised for the world's bantamweight title. Brown's seconds threw in the towel after Baldock had beat him up badly.

AUSTRALIAN IS LOSER ON FOUL

EBBETS Field, Brooklyn, Aug. 30, (UP)—Paul Swiderski, Syracuse light-heavyweight won over Tiger Payne, Australia, when referee Eddie Forbes disqualified the Australian for a low blow in the seventh round. Payne appeared to have the better of the fight until the foul was called.

Payne weighed 165 pounds, and Swiderski, 148 1/2.

Baby Joe Gans, Los Angeles, 139 1/2, scored a technical knock-out over Harry Felix, 142, of the East side, after 24 seconds in the ninth round. Felix twice went down for the count of nine.

"One-Round" Johnnie Francis Will Meet Bobby McIntyre in Main Event of Labor Day Card

Three of the fighters in action on the last fight card, which was one of the fastest ever seen in Klamath, will again don the torture gloves next Monday night in the great Labor Day fight card under the auspices of the Klamath labor unions.

First and foremost, "One-Round" Johnnie Francis, the deadly San Francisco lightweight, meets Bobby McIntyre of San Francisco in the ten-round main event. The boys fight at 133 pounds.
