Huge Rainbow Caught—

A huge rainbow trout, 28 inches long and weighing 10 pounds was on display in the window of the Midstate Hardware company here today. The big fish, one of the largest caught in Central Oregon this year, was landed inside the city limits of Bend by H. A. Hanson of the Lindenberg and Hanson shoe shop. Hanson caught the big trout just below the Deschutes river rapids near the north city limits. Inside the fish were found three smaller trout, victims of the huge rainbow. It was reported by M. B. JARDINE GIVES FARM AID PLAN

market his products at the peak of the prices; to be able to pay high wages to his help and to have the comforts of life.

Build Factories in West.

"Freight rates are high—they always will be high. To counteract this there should be more factories out here where the raw products are grown. Why should the stuff grown in Oregon and Idaho be shipped across the continent to be manufactured into products that are to be shipped back again to the consumer?

"I think that all factories that can use the farmers' and timbermen's products should be located near where the raw articles are grown. Then they can be shipped to Chicago, New York, Boston, Baltimore and other cities where the product is used. That would save a great deal and would benefit the producer."

At this point the secretary was joined by his brother, J. T. Jardine, of Oregon State Agricultural college, and W. O. Swenson of Idaho. Mrs. Jardine of Corvallis, was also present.

Increased Consumption.

The secretary continued: "Another thing I want the farmer to organize for is the increasing of consumption of his products."

Greater consumption is what he needs, along with the elimination of waste and the reduction of the cost of merchandising."

Secretary Jardine said that "this will be the best agricultural year since the war." He also said that Canada is "raising hell" with our grain producers.

"The wheat farmer is not getting as much for his grain as I would like to see him get," Mr. Jardine continued. "This is caused by the great crop in Canada. As this Canadian wheat is all rolled into the world's market at this time, it is responsible for the temporary low price the United States grower is receiving for his wheat."

"With the combine harvester and the fast methods we now have for harvesting, too much of the grain is thrown onto the market in too few months. It would be a great deal better for the farmer if he could hold back his grain and let it go to the market more gradually than at present. This would be one of the problems a large organization of growers could solve."

"Oregon's beef and mutton producers, as well as the dairy and poultry people, are now enjoying good prices. In fact, the market for these things is the best now that it has been since the low prices of June, 1921. At that time the purchasing power was rated at 67. Today, in the commodities named it is 100, and it is above 50 for all the farmers' products. It is practically back to normal for the first time in ten years."

"Before we get off this subject," Secretary Jardine declared, "I want to repeat that I am a crank on the organization of the farmers into a vast unit. It is a day of big organizations. Business has done it, thereby increasing production and wages, and selling the products of their factories at lower rates. I want to see the farmer do the same."

A Secretary Jardine's comment on politics was brief.

"Have you any observations on the political situation," he was asked.

"I can't," he answered.

CURTIS TALKS ABOUT TARIFF

Urges Women Voters to Increased Activity in Campaign.

WATKIN GLEN, N. Y., Aug. 29. (AP)—Tariff revision is the keynote of the eastern campaign of Senator Charles Curtis, republican vice-presidential nominee, who is carrying the brunt of his party's speaking drive in the east.

In an address at Syracuse yesterday the senator promised tariff revision to provide increased protection to agriculture as well as to industry and labor, and at Harrisburg tomorrow he is expected to emphasize this argument.

The vice-presidential nominee is continuing the practice of his western campaign, speaking three and four times a day. He rested in this quiet town today, however, after a strenuous visit to Syracuse.

There he delivered his principal address at the state fair grounds, but before that he spoke briefly at a reception, urging women voters to increased activity. He also visited a children's spelling bee, called at the grand stand at the fair grounds race track, and went to an Indian village where he witnessed a war dance. He spoke briefly on each visit.

my welcome would have been left to poverty."

He denounced the "killer" type as a menace to boxing, declaring the only joy to be obtained in a fight is by facing a man of physical and intellectual equality.

Gene's speech is described as a triumph of sincerity that carried all before it. The speaker is characterized as "an orator to whom words are music."

"Here was a speaker who had knocked the language cold and claimed a championship over its dead body," the writer says.

Among the distinguished men present at the dinner, perhaps thirty in all, none had a chance after Tunney's telling remarks, the scribe continues, but Arnold Bennett, the novelist, topped off the occasion with a graceful touch.

"A friend asked me to dinner," said the famous author, "but I told him I was going to dine with Tunney. You are a liar," the friend retorted. "You are boasting."
