Hagen in Lead on First Leg of Golf Match

DETROIT, Aug. 30. (UP)—Walter Hagen, holder of the British open golf championship, today won the first leg of his match with Johnny Farrell, open champion of the United States, for the unofficial world's golf championship.

Hagen won today's 36 hole match, 1 up, coming from behind on the last nine holes.

Today's match was the first of a series of five 36-hole matches to be played in five different cities, the winner of the "best three out of five" to be recognized unofficially as "world's champion."

Hagen was one down at the end of 27 holes but shot two birdies on the last nine while Farrell's putting failed miserably, the former taking two holes to win the match.

Farrell was 1 down at the turn of the first nine this morning and broke par on the second nine to be 1 up on Hagen at the half way point. Hagen evened the match on the 20th hole but took sixes on the 23rd and 24th to give the national open champion a two-hole lead. "The Hague" however, won the 26th and made the third at the 27th, one down.

The last nine had not progressed far when it was noticeable that Farrell was unsteady, especially in his putting. Hagen played his usual steady game and the two birdie holes were sufficient to swing the unofficial "world's champion title" in his direction.
