The Ewauna Purchase

From the standpoint of community interest, there is a vital difference between purchase of timber as an investment and purchase for manufacture.

The timber investor buys a tract, pays taxes, and hopes that the natural law of supply and demand will soon bring to his doors a buyer who is willing to give him a substantial profit on his investment. His is a business requiring foresight, judgment and the ability to strike while the iron is hot. But so far as the community is concerned, timber transfers from one investor to another are of no more interest than any other passing item of news.

But the purchase of timber for manufacturing, such as the 37,000-acre sale to the Ewauna Box company, is a different story. Manufacture means pay roll, increased population and the nucleus of a thriving industrial community.

As the largest lumber company in Klamath Basin, as an industrial institution owned and directed by Klamath men who have resided in Klamath Falls most of their lives, and as the source of the greatest single pay roll in this city, the Ewauna Box company's move in acquiring the E. A. Booth tract in eastern Klamath is viewed with satisfaction and enthusiasm through the Klamath country.

This model mill, nurtured from a humble beginning to its present prominence by the wisdom and far-sightedness of its backers, is now assured a cut for the next fifteen years. The pay roll, which is one of the foundations of this city's prosperity, is assured for years to come, and the community gain from each thousand board feet of timber—estimated at \$18—will continue to pour into the prosperity channels of Klamath Falls.

The Union High School

By its schools, its hotels, its court house, its streets and its business buildings, is a community judged. The tourist, the casual visitor, the commercial salesman, the hurried business man, quickly absorb these features of a city, hasten on their way, and in more leisurely moments discourse on the city they had seen, basing their judgment on these observations.

Hasty as it is, this mode of judgment is eminently fair; for in its public spirit, manifested by public buildings, is the soul of a community shown. If the community is selfish, narrow and parsimonious, the schools will be out of date, the streets unpaved, the hotels, frame and shabby structures, and the public buildings out of date.

So it is that this paper, as a component part of the Klamath community, expresses pride and satisfaction over the new Union High school which overlooks the city and the Klamath Basin from the knoll which was once known as the Hot Springs court house site, but which is now known as the Union High school. The building represents the last word in modern school architecture and construction. From the heating system, to the spacious auditorium, the structure reflects the careful thought and constructive activity of the Union High school board which submitted the proposal for a new school to the city, and which labored unceasingly until its successful completion.

Machinery, Prunes, Warehouse Burn

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 31. (UP)

—Destruction of a warehouse and machinery owned by L. P. Lachmund of this city together with a pack of dried prunes owned by the Pacific Northwest Prune association of Vancouver, Wash., by fire early today resulted in a loss estimated in excess of \$65,000 covered by insurance.

The loss to the warehouse is placed by Lachmund at \$40,000 with loss to the Prune Pack of the P. N. P. association estimated at \$25,000. The origin of the fire has not been determined. Adjoining buildings including the large warehouse of the Willamette Grocery company just across the street from the Lachmund warehouse was saved only through heroic work on the part of the fire companies. The warehouse was formerly occupied by the Drager Fruit company.
