## BISHOP'S HOME RUNS IN NINTH BEATS YANKEES

### Dramatic Blow Saves Macken From Rout In Crucial Series

Thanks to Max Bishop, the Philadelphia Athletics have been saved from utter rout in the new famous battle of the Bronx.

After smashing the A's into defeat in the first three skrimishes of the crucial general engagement, Miller Huggins' Yankee brigade ran afoul of Bishop's ninth-inning home run in the fourth clash yesterday. That dramatic blow carried with it a 4 to 3 victory for the Macken and enabled them to beat a dispirited, if somewhat hasty retreat from the Yankee Stadium.

The Yankees thus saw their American League lead clipped to a slim and a-half, a margin the Athletics hope will prove not impossible to overcome when the two clubs invade the west on Saturday for the closing games of the season. The Yanks have 15 games and the A's 13 west of the Alleghenies.

## TIME LOST IN START OF RACE PILOTS CLAIM

(UP)—The protest of 16 pilots in Class A of the transcontinental air derby that they lost time in the take-off at Kansas City airport last Friday because of a "misunderstanding" was "unjustifiable," the Kansas City committee declared late yesterday.

If the protest had been allowed, it may have affected the standings of the racers as they finished in Los Angeles. Some contended that W. H. Emery, Jr., Bradford, Pa., winner of second place, would have ousted Earl Rowland, Wichita, Kansas, as first place winner if time "lost" in the take-off from Kansas City had been deducted from Emery's elapsed time.

Rowland was the first pilot to take off at Kansas City, leaving at 7 a. m. Friday. One minute later Robert Duke, Pittsburgh, left and Emery was third to leave but he did not hop off until 7:31.

The answer of the local committee, declaring the protest was "unjustifiable" was sent to Dudley M. Steele of Los Angeles, chairman of the air race committee.
