WASHINGTON, Sept. 13. (AP)—President Coolidge returned to Washington this morning from his vacation in Wisconsin and was met at the station by Herbert Hoover and several members of his cabinet.

The welcoming party included Secretary Kellogg, Secretary Davis of the war department, Attorney General Sargent and Chairman Work of the republican national committee. Mrs. Hoover was also present and greeted Mrs. Coolidge as she alighted from the train.

All of those who went to the station to meet the president were lined up alongside the railroad tracks as his train came in and Mr. Hoover waved at the engineer who held the throttle.

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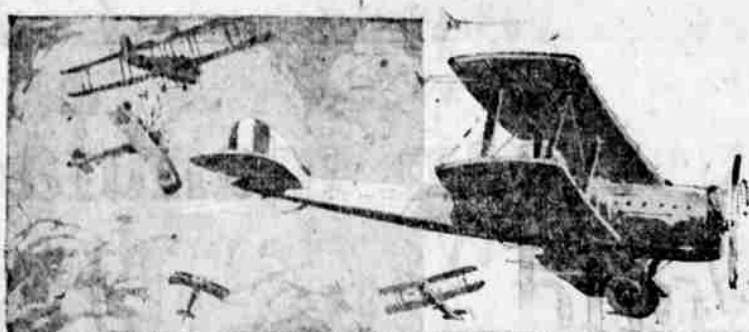
