Register and Vote

LET NO KLAMATH CITIZEN criticize city or county government unless he has exercised his franchise of vote.

If there was less talk, more thought and more votes at all elections in the county, state and nation, the fountain head of possible government corruption—public indifference to public problems—would be sealed.

Not since the 1912 campaign of Wilson, Roosevelt and Taft, has a national election been so vital, so crucial and so important to the American people as the present campaign. If a citizen is "too busy" to vote, he has simply failed in a duty, and has no more right to criticize policies or government after successful candidates take office than has an illiterate alien.

To vote, one must first register. October 5, at 5 p. m., registration books will close. If there is any doubt about your registration, check up at the county clerk's office so that, under no circumstance, will you be denied the right to cast your vote general election day, November 6.

BURGLAR TRIO

NEWPORT, R. I., Sept. 13. (UP).—Three burglars, two men and a woman, outfitted with all the accoutrements necessary to their trade, robbed two summer homes of socially prominent New Yorkers, were driven from a third, and put a temporary crimp into the wedding plans of two persons, police divulged last night.

The robberies occurred early today but police did not make them public until tonight for an unexplained reason.

Shortly after 2 a. m., Mrs. James Oliver O'Donnell, of New York and Washington, was awakened by a noise, she opened the door of her bedroom and saw the three burglars—their faces masked and each carrying a revolver, small "swag" bundle, searchlight and a "billy."

She shut the door and telephoned for the police, when the officers arrived, the trio had disappeared. A hasty examination revealed, according to the police, that some jewelry and a great part of the wedding trousseau of Mrs. O'Donnell's daughter, Eileen, had been taken. Miss O'Donnell is to be married soon in Washington. It was understood.

Next Door.
While police searched the vicinity for the robbers, the daring trio was busily engaged next door ransacking the home of Sidney Colford, Jr., of New York. Colford, who is soon to be married to Miss Elizabeth Oakes, at Brookline, Mass., lost virtually his entire wedding outfit, police said.

When the police gave up the search in the neighborhood, the robbers attempted to break into the home of Mrs. Rosson Lyman Wood, next door to Colford's residence, but a maid heard the noise and screamed. The thieves walked leisurely to their automobile parked at the curb and drove away.
