### Philadelphia Cuts Down Yanks' Lead One Game Yesterday

There's not much to choose between the two major league pennant races but the fact remains that most of the drama is being enacted in the American League.

The St. Louis Cardinals have made the National League battle more or less of a cut-and-dried proposition by the simple process of matching anything their closest competitors may or may not achieve. If the New York Giants lose the Cardinals manage to do the same thing, if they win, Bill McKechnie's boys see to it that John McGraw doesn't profit in the standings thereby.

But in the American League, Miller Huggins' champion New York Yankees have given their supporters more alternate moments of ecstatic joy and dismal gloom than is good for the constitution, even of a leather-lunged Bronx fan.

From good to bad and back again, Yankee fortunes have gone this year. The Bronx was in deep mourning today, for the Yankees, losing a 12-inning battle to the Chicago White Sox yesterday, saw the Philadelphia Athletics creep to within one game of the lead again.

Meanwhile the National League remained unchanged as the Cardinals and the Giants tangled in a double bill and emerged with one victory apiece as home runs flew thick and fast at the Polo grounds. What advantage there was for McGraw to McKeechnie for he got rid of two more games from his schedule without losing any ground to his chief rival.

Pitchers got none of the glory at the Polo grounds. George Harper, who once patrolled right field for McGraw, took things in his own hands in the first game, crashing out three home runs, and the Cardinals coasted to an 8 to 5 victory.

The boys calmed down a bit in the second game until the eighth inning when the Giants, fighting to overcome a two run lead, called into old "Pete" Alexander for five runs, four of them on Hogan's second home run of the day—a mammoth drive into the left field bleachers. That left the score 7 to 4 and there it remained.

**Delaney Wins Over Tassi in Eleventh**

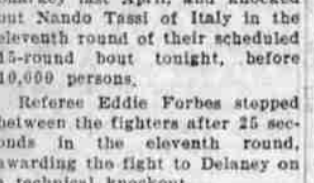
EBBETS FIELD, BROOKLYN, Sept. 21. (UP)—Jack Delaney, former light heavyweight champion, returned to the ring for the first time since his one-round knockout at the hands of Jack Sharkey last April, and knocked out Nando Tassi of Italy in the eleventh round of their scheduled 15-round bout tonight, before 10,000 persons.

Referee Eddie Forbes stopped between the fighters after 25 seconds in the eleventh round, awarding the fight to Delaney on a technical knockout.

Delaney had Tassi down twice before the bout was stopped. Tassi rushed in the first round after Delaney landed with a punishing left and as Delaney stepped back the Italian half-slipped down for a count of eight.

Tassi went down from a left uppercut in the ninth round, but was up without a count.

of a bureau of the republican national committee to the office of an anti-Catholic periodical in Washington," Mann said. "Senator Robinson, his running mate, in a speech the same night at Owensboro, Ky., stated that I conducted a secker after such material to a source where it could be obtained."

"I have already denounced this story as a falsehood in the columns of the paper which printed it ten days ago. I repeat this denunciation. The truth is that this paper, or the Tammany national organization, sent a female detective to my office to procure some evidence along this line. Misstating her identity, she called three times and was told that we had no such literature and did not know where it could be obtained. The fourth time she asked a clerk at these headquarters to look up for her the address of a publication she named in the telephone book, which as a courtesy he did for her. In other words, this was an attempted frame-up through a detective which failed because there was nothing here for her to find, and the flimsy story which I have publicly denounced was the result."

"This detective in her statement specifically disclaimed seeing me. Yet Senator Robinson says that I directed her to a place where she could get anti-Smith religious literature, and Governor Smith declares that 'the head of the bureau,' evidently meaning me, 'put her in an automobile.' This is an improvement on the original caricature in the direction of further misrepresentation."

### Gene O'Grady to Fight Monie Rogers; Harrington Meets Rosander

Announcement was made this afternoon by Joe "Tex" Bickerstaff, fight promoter, that Gene O'Grady, Ashland, would meet Monie Rogers of Hood River in the six round semi-windup of the fight card in Klamath Falls, September 28.

As an added attraction, Bickerstaff signed another "natural" in the form of a four round special event between Wilbur Harrington, fighting Indian, and Austin Rosander.

The main event will be a ten round bout between Nails Gorman of Hood River and Jack Crilley of Klamath Falls.

Rogers, a clever middleweight, has been seen in action before. He met a lad named Harmon. In the second round he injured his left hand, but pounded Harmon so hard with the remaining mitt, that they stopped the fight.

O'Grady, in reality a main event fighter, has the same fighting heart that carried Jack Dempsey to the top. Given not a chance against Karl O'Carroll of San Francisco, O'Grady came out of his corner like a buzz saw and inside of two minutes had pounded the Irishman into insensibility. Knocked flat for two nine counts in the seventh round of his fight with Young Peter Jackson of Portland, Gene staged a great come-back in the remaining minutes to barely squeeze through at the finish tape for a draw.

In their first fight, Harrington and Rosander almost stole the show at Chiloquin. They stood toe to toe and slugged for six rounds. Rosander was given the nod over the game Indian, which made Harrington and his friends so mad that they can't wait for the return bout.

In the meantime, Crilley is working out enthusiastically for his coming bout with his rival, Nails Gorman—the same Gorman who held the slugging San Franciscan to a draw in Klamath Falls several weeks ago. Crilley claims the only reason he didn't get Gorman was that he injured his hand in the second round. He swears it'll be a different story this time.

Gorman is in the northern part of the state and, according to a wire from his manager today, is in great shape for the forthcoming fight.

**BOYS ROUNDED UP**  
SAN DIEGO, Calif., Sept. 21. (AP)—Two hundred and fifty men were sent in automobile trucks from San Diego today to fight the brush and forest fire that started yesterday in Chihuahu valley, and up to noon today had burned over more than 30,000 acres of land. The flames covered a front of 15 miles. There has been no loss of life.

An urgent appeal to the sheriff of San Diego county for 1000 men to fight the flames was made this morning by Luther Gordon, county fire warden. Gordon declared that unless the fire is checked today it will sweep down a canyon for 10 miles and do a large amount of damage.

At noon today the flames were reported to be within one and one-half miles of Warner's Hot Springs.

Four men and one woman who last night were reported to have been surrounded by the fire succeeded in escaping without injury. It was reported.

J. E. Elliott, supervisor of the Cleveland National Forest, led a party that found and rescued the quintet.
