STANFORD SET BACK, 12 TO 6 IN FIRST GAME

Morton Kaer Wriggles and Twists Way to Touchdowns

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Oct. 1. (UP)—The fighting Olympic club of San Francisco evened the score with an ancient enemy when their football team defeated the Stanford Cardinals by a score of 12-6 Saturday.

Throughout the first half Stanford outplayed the clubmen in every department. The Cardinals scored in the first quarter when a pass from Hoffman to Wilson placed the ball on the Olympic club's seven yard line. The Stanford captain then plunged through center for the score. His try at placement was blocked.

In the second quarter there was no scoring although the Olympic eleven had the ball on Stanford's one-foot line only to lose when the Cardinal forwards stiffened.

The clubmen came on the field fighting at the beginning of the second half. They scored early when a sensational pass from Kaer to Ford gained 45 yards and a touchdown. Allen failed to convert.

The Olympic eleven scored again in the final quarter when Morton Kaer received a Stanford punt on his own 40-yard line and ran, wriggled and squirmed through the entire Cardinal team for a touchdown. Allen again failed for the extra point.

Stanford threatened again with only a few seconds to play in the final quarter. A trick pass from Miller to Clark netted 33 yards but Clark fumbled and the clubmen recovered on their own 17-yard line. It was Stanford's last punch and their chance to tie or win the game died there.

MONTANA STATE DEFEATS IDAHO BY AIR ROUTE

Smart Signals First Used in 1914 Series

USING THE BALLS AND STRIKES ON THE HITTER AS A KEY TO COMBINATION FINGER SIGNS

In probably no other department of baseball have there been as many radical changes as in catchers' signals to their pitchers during the last fifteen years. Up until 1914 even the smartest of major league catchers had used virtually the same signs for fast, curve and waste balls that they had used when they were boys on the sand lots.

In 1914 world series smart baseball men realized that there was nothing to prevent runners on second base from tipping these simple signs to the batter and letting him know just what kind of ball the pitcher was delivering and what to expect. George Stallings, Hank Gowdy, Johnny Evers and the late Pat Morgan developed the first revolutionary step in catchers' signs when they developed a series of three signs, the second one being the real sign.

Later there developed variations of this system of three signs. The odd and even system was one. The catcher showed a different number of fingers three times in succession. The pitcher simply added up the number of fingers shown by the catcher. If they added up even it called for a fast ball, if they totaled an odd figure, a curve ball was thrown.

Later only one sign was used with a number of key movements that changed it into meaning either a fast ball, curve or waste ball. The number of balls and strikes on a batter was used in one system, the batter really unknowingly calling his own signs on himself.

LUCK OF IRISH GIVES ROCKNE GAME SATURDAY

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Oct. 1. (UP)—The luck of the Irish proved too much for Loyola University of New Orleans Saturday when Coach Kaute Rockne's Notre Dame warriors turned a last minute break into a touchdown and a 12 to 6 victory.

A fumble by Lopez, Loyola quarterback, shortly before the end of the game paved the way for the Irish score. Notre Dame recovered the ball on Loyola's 23 yard line and immediately unleashed a series of passes, Njemic to O'Brien, that put the ball within a yard of the goal. Shay then crashed through the line for the winning points.

Loyola led at the end of the first half, 6-0, but a 45 yard run for a touchdown by Johnny Elder, fleet Notre Dame track star, tied the score, early in the third quarter.

Loyola's touchdown was scored near the end of the second quarter after a sustained drive from midfield.

Lopez twisted through center for his team's only points.

Green Chicago Team Defeated by S. C. 6 to 0

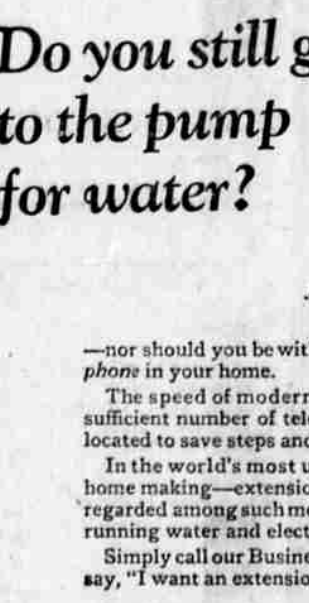

Portland Beavers Take Twin Bill From Mission Boys

With three games left to be played of the second half of the season, San Francisco and Sacramento are tied for the leadership. A defeat at the hands of Portland put Sacramento back into a tie when the Seals took the twin bill from the Missions. Hollywood fell twice before Los Angeles and is three games behind the leaders.

Seal-Mission Game Thrills

The morning Seal-Mission game was filled with thrills, the Hell leading 4 to 0 in the seventh when the Seals got back into the game to score three. Two added in the eighth and the triple play started by Smead Jolly in the ninth put the game in the hat bag, 5 to 4. The Seals got nine runs in the first two frames of the finale and coasted to a 14 to 2 victory.
