Nord To Build Nursery, Plans Modern Plant

A deal was closed Saturday in which E. O. Nord, head of the Personal Landscape Service, acquired a tract of land in the Altamont Acres upon which he will establish a nursery to be known as the Klamath Falls Nursery.

To Raise Nursery Stock.
It is the intention of Mr. Nord to raise a major part of the nursery stock he uses here and acclimate the rest. In this way, people of this section will be more certain of the trees and shrubs they plant for they will be acclimated to Klamath Falls seasons.

"Because our spring comes at least two months later than spring in the valley or California, it is almost impossible to bring nursery stock over here for planting as in most cases it will be matured and it is risky to transplant at this stage," Mr. Nord stated.

Trees and shrubs should be absolutely dormant when planted. Because of the peculiar climate it is almost impossible to secure dormant stock in the spring. Nursery stock held dormant by cold storage is safe to plant but it takes an extra year for it to get started.

To Cultivate Native Shrubs.
Mr. Nord intends to cultivate and propagate native trees and shrubs to use in landscape work, which will be carried along with his other work.

The Alpine Garden stock of the Montvale Gardens of Spokane is being purchased by Mr. Nord. "There are many beautiful Alpine plants in the mountains around Klamath Falls that will be beautiful in Alpine Gardens and I intend to cultivate as many of them as I possibly can," he concluded.

An invitation will be extended to the public to visit the nursery as soon as it is completed.

Insofar as we are responsible for what is said, there must be nothing that may be construed for or against any political faction. Do not use stories of election betting, or straw votes. In describing attendance at political meetings, do not estimate capacity in numbers or in any manner open to dispute.
But we want all the news. Do not withhold a story because it is partisan, if it may be attributed to a responsible source. For example, statements from political headquarters are desired if they contain news and are credited to party spokesmen. These statements must speak for themselves, and their leads should be brief, without inference, deduction or other editorial comment. All anonymous expressions of opinion must be avoided. Write only what can be substantiated.
During the campaign, as at all other times, The Associated Press report must be fair, truthful and impartial.
