



U. S. C. ELEVEN IS PRIMED FOR OREGON STATE

**Coach Howard Jones
Afraid of Powerful
Oregon Eleven**

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 5. (AP)—Coach Howard Jones will throw his University of Southern California football machine into high gear against the Oregon State team here tomorrow.

Feeling that the Corvallis squad is not a team to be trifled with, the Trojan coach has made it known that Don Williams will start at quarterback against the invaders and will stay in the game as long as necessary.

Marshall Duffield, who started in last Saturday's game against the Utah Aggies, will relieve Williams and it is believed by Jones that the promising sophomore signal caller will have recovered from the nervousness which characterized his first varsity game last week.

Southern California is favored to defeat Oregon State by at least a seven point margin in the Pacific coast conference battle.

Those who do their arguing with the green paper figured that both teams will score, but give the Trojan the edge because they are primed for Oregon State; they are to be a more experienced team than last year and their offense is more varied than it was a season back. Last year Paul Schlusser's gridlers scored 12 points to Southern California's 13.

The Trojan lineup to start today had slimmered down to a backfield composed of Williams, quarterback; Lloyd Thomas and Harry Edelson, halfbacks, and Russ Saunders, fullback, and the forward wall of Nate Barrager, center; Galloway, Boren, guards; Shaw, Anthony, tackles; Hibbs, McCaslin, ends.

The Oregon team arriving here today will work out at the Coliseum in the afternoon.

PRINCE LEAVES FOR BUCHAREST

PARIS, Oct. 5. (UP)—Prince Nicholas of Rumania, who has been the subject of wild speculation in Paris, left tonight in the direction of Bucharest.

The prince travelled incognito and was accompanied by an aide. The mysterious woman who had been in his company for the last week was not with him.

His brother, Prince Carol, said farewell to the prince at the Rumanian legation, scoffing at reports that Nicholas had eloped with a beautiful Bucharest society woman and had refused to return to the Rumanian capital.

Big Series Sidelights

Despite forecasts of unfavorable weather for the second game of the world's series today, Samuel Thomas and Francis Chapman, who hitch-hiked from Dover, N. H., to New York, took the first two places in the \$1 line outside the Yankee Stadium at 1 o'clock this morning. At that hour a man who called himself "Kid Hoffman of Philadelphia," held the fort at the \$3 booths all by himself.

On the short end of 5 to 3 odds before the series opened, the Yankees this morning were quoted at 10 to 7 to win.

Walter Johnson, who has done a bit of pitching in his time, was at the first game. "They look like the same old Yankees," he said, after Meusel's home run.

A few months ago Clarence Mitchell and Jimmy Wilson, Cardinal battermen, were toiling for the Phillies, who failed this season to deviate from their usual custom of finishing eighth in an eight-club league.

Lou Gehrig added more laurels to his sensational baseball career today when he poked out a home run with two on the bases in the first inning of the second world series game between the New York Yankees and the St. Louis Cardinals.

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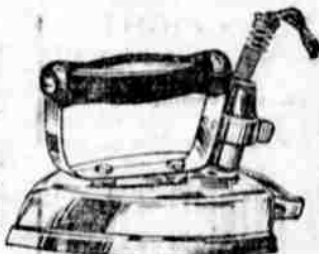
