

CONDITIONS OF TEAM GOOD ON EVE OF BATTLE

Stanford Thirteen Point Favorite Over University of Oregon

SEASIDE, Ore., Oct. 6, (AP)—With Stanford University a 13-point favorite, the Cardinals from Palo Alto and the University of Oregon Webfoots were on hand here today for the first coast conference football game in which either has appeared this season.

Both teams were in excellent condition. All Oregon players were in shape to play when the first drill came to an end. Even Johnny Kitzmiller, star back of the Freshman team last season, who has been out most of this year with injuries, was in uniform and stepping fast.

The Stanford squad of 38 players had a light workout lasting but a few minutes yesterday, and appeared to be in fine condition. The workout was only in the nature of a limbering-up exercise, designed to work off the effects of the journey northward by train.

Pre-game estimates placed from eight to ten thousand fans in the stands of Hayward field. Uncertain weather made it doubtful whether the field would be wet or dry. As Stanford worked out yesterday the field was moist, but not wet enough to interfere with their snappy handling of the ball.

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McGraw Signals For Pitches From Bench



McGraw, usually always the "YANK" sign of the WORLD SERIES, AS "STRAC" SIGN FOR GIANT PITCHERS.

Giants) Manager John McGraw's weakness for pitching important games during the season and particularly World Series games from the bench, has led to many odd situations. In pitching from the bench, McGraw uses a system of signs by which he tells his pitcher what he wants pitched on each ball, such as a "fast ball," "curve ball," "change of pace" or "waste ball."

Naturally there is often a difference of opinion between the pitcher and catcher as to the advisability of throwing to a batter in a pinch, a fast ball or a curve. Under these conditions the pitcher often "shakes" off the catcher's sign until he gets the sign for the particular kind of ball he wants to deliver.

McGraw, in order to make sure that his own signs from the bench to the catcher are not "shaken" off by the pitcher, has a personal sign to circumvent this. If the sign comes from McGraw direct, the catcher snaps his thumb after going through his regular set of finger signs.

This shows the pitcher that the sign comes directly from the Giant manager and it would take a brave twirler indeed who would "shake" McGraw's instructions off.

The only pitcher I ever knew that McGraw let pitch his own game under any and every condition was the immortal Christy Mathewson.

CLUB EXPOSES FUEL 'RACKET'

Adulterated Gasoline Used in Ohio; May Be National Steal

CLEVELAND, Oct. 6.—A "gasoline racket" that may prove to exist nationally has been disclosed by the Cleveland Automobile club from a survey it made of the types of fuel sold in this area.

The survey shows that much adulterated gasoline is being sold to motorists under various guises, and that back of the attraction of lower prices lie greater profits due to the mixture of inferior oils with the gasoline.

This situation was revealed by the auto club after it had been led to make the survey and analyze some 49 different brands of gasoline sold in the Cleveland area, upon complaints made by motorists and dealers.

"The reason back of this adulteration is two-fold," says Fred H. Caley, secretary of the Cleveland Auto club.

"One is to cheapen a product so that it may be sold under a price that reputable firms, selling an honest product, are compelled to charge.

"The second is that adulteration of gasoline permits the sale of a product upon which partial payment of the state gasoline tax of three cents a gallon may be evaded.

"The 'racket' works pretty much in this fashion: 'A certain quantity of gaso-

line is purchased—100 gallons, for instance. On this purchase the state gasoline tax of three cents per gallon is paid. 'A quantity of kerosene is then purchased, but on this no tax is required. 'Then, by mixing with the 100 gallons of kerosene, 130 gallons of alleged motor fuel are produced. These 130 gallons are sold to the motoring public, who pay the full tax on each of the 130 gallons of alleged gasoline.

Construction New Hotel in Bly Announced

Construction of a new hotel, pool room and cafe is to start immediately in North Bly, it was announced yesterday by C. A. Sheaffer, manager of the Klamath Billiard parlors, who will be the owner of the new business.

According to plans a two story building 104 feet by 24 feet will be erected. The upper story will contain 20 bedrooms while a restaurant, pool room, card room, and soft drink parlor will be downstairs.

The site for the new building was purchased from A. J. Hanson, owner of North Bly, through G. A. Hoffman, local insurance man.

Bly on the new extension of the O. C. & E. railroad now being constructed to Sprague River is showing considerable building activity and is leading a close race with the rapidly growing little town of Sprague River.

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
