TAGGED SPRIG IS SHOT DOWN

From whence do they come, whither are they bound?

Another page of this mystery regarding the annual flights of migratory birds has been uncovered by the United States Biological Survey.

Last fall C. C. Sperry, biological survey investigator, caught a sick sprig drake on Tule lake, brought the bird to a pen on Conger avenue for observation, and, when the duck was well, placed a metal tag around its leg and released it. Mr. Sperry devoted several months of his time to investigating the duck disease situation.

Word has finally been received of this bird's fate. It was shot dead in British Honduras, near Belize, Central America, three months after it was released from Klamath.

"This," said Ray Steele, federal game warden, "is one of the most southern points to which we have traced migratory ducks on this line of flight. It is extremely interesting, as it gives the biological survey an insight into the migratory movements of these birds."

Last year several birds were shot on Tule lake that had been tagged in Alaska and Montana.

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precision, and with less fuss at the start than it takes to get a trans-Atlantic liner away from her pier.

Shortly before 7 a. m. the doors of the huge hangar swung open and preparations were begun to clear the ship. All the members of the crew took their posts and then the passengers were taken on board.

At a shouted order the airship's hawsers were attached by pulleys to running blocks on either side. The huge craft was dragged slowly and steadily out of the hangar.

Within two minutes after it was free of the hangar the hawsers were detached and 200 stalwart workmen who had been hanging to the lower gunwale let go. The Graf Zeppelin immediately ascended almost perpendicularly to an elevation of about 150 feet. The nose was pointed upward and the airship rose higher as it circled low over Friedrichshafen. Finally it headed westward over Lake Constance and in three minutes the craft had disappeared from view on what was hoped to be the third east and west flight across the Atlantic in a lighter than air craft. This ship is named for the late Count Von Zeppelin, German airship builder and inventor, Graf being the German word for count.

Before climbing into the ship, Dr. Eckener said:

"I expect to reach New York Sunday morning. The last weather reports, dated 2 a. m., speak of heavy storms. Under these circumstances, of course, it is impossible to determine the exact route in advance. In general, however, I can say we will stick to the southern course, flying over France, and then heading southward to avoid a depression which is moving to and fro between Newfoundland and Ireland. The northern route is out of the question."

Captain E. A. Lehman, navigation officer, said that it was quite possible that the airship would go as far south as the coast of Africa and then head for the Azores. He said that the most interesting thing about the trip, in view of the weather situation, was that her navigation would offer opportunities to experts on board for interesting meteorological studies.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11. (UP)—President Coolidge will hold a radiotelephone conversation with the king of Spain at the official opening of the United States Spanish telephone service at 10 a. m. Saturday, the White House announced today.

Mr. Coolidge will talk with the king from the U. S. Chamber of Commerce building.
