DURING the coming year, members of Eulalia chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution are planning to place temporary markers on a number of the outstanding historic spots of the county. From time to time, as funds are available, the chapter will place permanent markers.

It will be interesting to know some of the places to be marked by the chapter:

Fort Klamath 1863-1889 Military post, concentration point for troops during the Modoc and Snake (Palate) wars.

Camp Kowasta, site of the old log Klamath Agency and stockade at head of Upper Klamath Lake, 1856-1865.

Yainax Sub Agency, Camp Yainax during Modoc War, established 1869.

Council Grove, site of treaty with Klamaths, Modocs and Yahooskin Snakes, Treaty signed October 15, 1864.

Battle Ground on Williamson River, where Fremont and Kit Carson fought Klamaths, 1846.

Rock Creek, where an Indian Chief and three of Fremont's men were killed in 1846. Fremont called the creek "Denny Creek" from one of his men killed there.

Lost River Gap, where Colonel Elmer Otis, U. S. Army, held a council with Keintpoos (Captain Jack) in 1872, a few months before the war. Otis had six men and Jack had 29.

Site of first fight of Modoc War, at Captain Jack's winter camp on Lost River, November 29, 1872. Captain James Jackson, U. S. Army and Keintpoos (Captain Jack).

Wollaphe Snake treaty ground at Yainax Butte on Sprague River, August 12, 1865.

Point near state line in Tule Lake basin where Sara Brotherton at their cabin defended herself and children with a rifle after her husband and older son had been killed by Modocs, November 29, 1872. Settlers were killed by the Modocs that day.
