FAVOR TROJANS TO WIN GAME

Golden Bears and U. S. C. Will Meet This Afternoon

BERKELEY, Cal., Oct. 20. (A.P.)—The University of California Bears, and the University of Southern California Trojans, came out of their secluded country club retreats today to meet in the California Memorial stadium in one of the crucial football games of the Pacific Coast conference.

The Trojans took the field slightly favored to win, principally because of the flashy quarterback, Don Williams, who excels in the southern backfield. Spectators pointed, however, to the Memorial field, somewhat short of grass, and upon which it will be hard for the Trojan to pivot and swerve as sharply as he usually does.

Approximately 79,000 tickets were sold for the game.

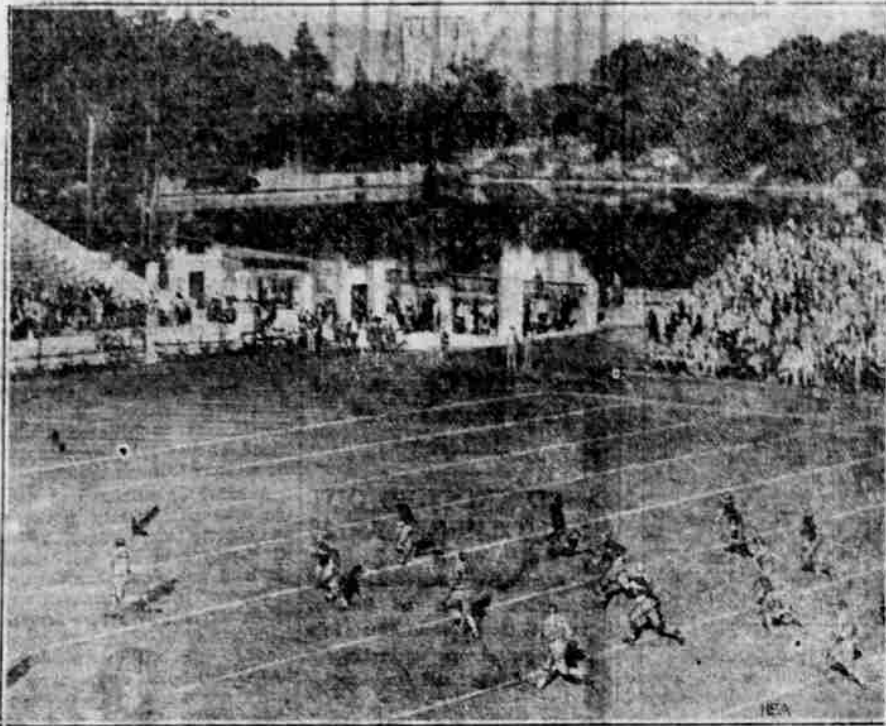

GREAT THROG ATTENDS HUSKY OREGON CLASH

Estimate Crowd Will Reach 30,000 in Multnomah Field Stadium

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 20. (A.P.)—An estimate made a few hours before game time today placed 30,000 fans in the stands of Multnomah Field stadium to watch the University of Oregon and the University of Washington football eleven in their annual "big" game. At midnight Friday it was announced that the seat sale had already passed the record mark for football games in Portland.

Both teams held a light workout on the field yesterday afternoon. Coach McKean of Oregon took no chances of having his players' rest disturbed last night and immediately after the workout took them to the Weaverville Country club where they spent the night. The Washington squad was quartered at a downtown hotel.

Betting odds on the game favored Washington. The huskies were quoted at 10 to 7 1-2 by the speculators. This, despite the rumor that 15 Washington players were suffering from pneumonia poisoning. Coach Bagshaw declared on his arrival here with the team that several players were slightly indisposed following their training table meal Wednesday but that it was nothing serious. He said this would not effect the playing of the team.

Today's game marks the 23rd meeting of the teams on the gridiron since athletic relations were established between the two universities. The Huskies have won 11 games and Oregon 8. Three were ties.

Over-Anxious Paolino Loses On Foul Blow

EBBETS FIELD, BROOKLYN, N. Y., Oct. 20. (U.P.)—Big Boy Peterson, towering New Orleans heavyweight, won an astounding victory over Paulino Uzcudun, Basque wood chopper, and one of the leading candidates for the vacant heavyweight title—on a foul after 2 minutes 20 seconds of fighting in the second round of a scheduled 10-round bout today.

The end came suddenly and left a crowd of 5,000 spectators gasping. Paulino had floored Peterson for a count of nine with a left hook to the jaw early in the second round and the big New Orleans heavyweight was reeling and rocking around the ring on the verge of a knockout when the foul occurred.

The Basque drove Peterson into a corner with a two-fisted attack. Peterson's knees were wobbly and he was unable to defend himself as Paulino rushed in, swinging both fists wildly. Paulino missed a terrific right and then landed a left hook. Peterson reeled groggily against the ropes in Paulino's corner and slowly sank to his knees on the floor.

Standing over Peterson, Paulino hit his fallen opponent with a vicious left uppercut. Referee Lou Magnolia was on top of the fighters and quickly seized Paulino by the shoulders and jerked him as hard as the Spaniard fell bodily to the canvas.

Defounded, Paulino stood near the ropes unable to comprehend Referee Magnolia's decision. Peterson, glass-eyed and still on his knees, was unable to rise under his own strength. Peterson's seconds were called.

into the ring and helped him to his stool. It took several minutes to bring Peterson completely to.

Peterson weighed 291; Paulino 199½. It was Paulino's first appearance in this country since he lost a decision to George Godfrey at Los Angeles last February.



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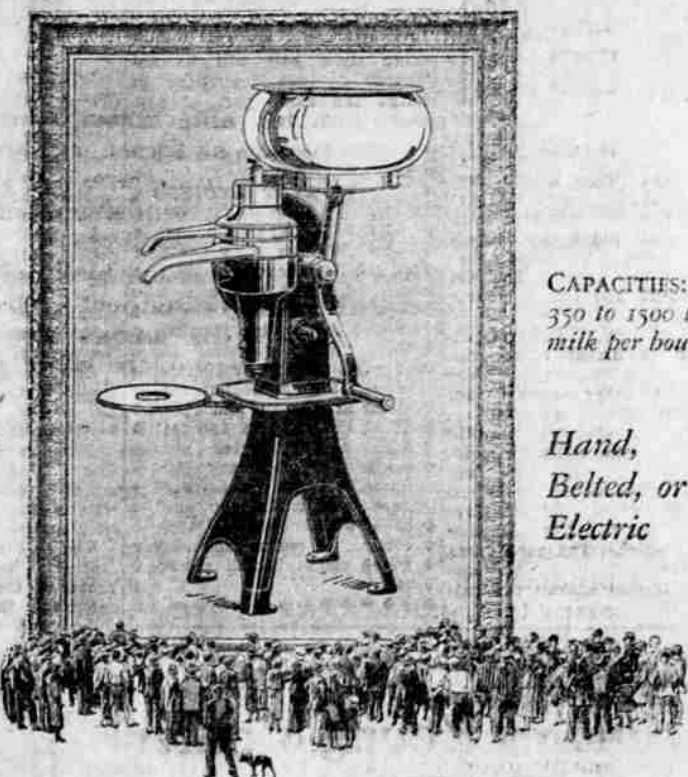
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Sheep Breeders Establishing Production Standards
