

Johnnie Francis and Kewpie Riley Ready for Opening Bell Tonight

BOTH BOYS IN "PINK" FOR TEN-ROUND MAIN EVENT AT VETS ARENA

Betting Odds Ten to Eight in Favor of Francis; Rest of Card Gives Promise of Much Action This Evening

In the "pink" of condition for their ten round main event at the vets arena tonight, Johnnie Francis, Klamath Falls lightweight, and Kewpie Riley, Portland flash, weighed in this morning and then spent the rest of the day resting up for their supreme test in the "squared" circle tonight.

Francis weighed in at 133 pounds; Riley, 131 pounds. Both fighters have trained carefully for the fight.

"One Round" Johnnie, by virtue of his last three sensational victories in Klamath, is anxious to retain and increase the standing he has with Klamath fight fans. Riley, on the other hand, says the fight game around Portland isn't too active and is anxious to work up a following in Klamath.

The boys have met once before. Riley barely outpointed Francis in their first match several years ago.

Kewpie is rated as the third best man at his weight in the northwest. It wasn't until he ran into a right from Ritchie King, Seattle phenom, in a recent main event in Portland, that he received a set-back. Half conscious, Riley's fighting spirit brought him back to his feet nine times before he was knocked entirely out in the ninth round. Sporting editors commented on his wonderful gameness.

From the standpoint of the dope sheet, there is little to choose between the two boys. Riley packs a hard wallop and is a little faster than Francis. Johnnie, however, has the hardest punch in either hand and is dangerous against any opponent. Both are game to core.

Of one thing the majority of Klamath fans are sure; that is that the fight will not be one of these one round affairs, where there are just two blows struck, one when Francis hits his adversary and the second when the adversary hits the floor.

Chiloquin and Portland fight fans who are coming to the fight favor Riley to win; Klamath Falls cash customers are putting up their "dough" on Johnnie.

"I've got a job tonight," said Francis, "and while I may not be able to get Riley in the first, I'll be in there all the time trying to get him as soon after the going as I can."

The new boys will display their wares in the persons of Frankie Warnicke, Portland, and Harry Johnson of San Francisco, welterweights. They will fight the semi-windup.

The special event of tonight's card will be between Mike Carr, the long rangy boy with a hard left, and Sam Philby of Portland, a likely looking boy. Carr managed to get over Harold

Army After Yale; Pennsylvania Wants Revenge for Defeat

NEW YORK, Oct. 26, (AP)—The times appear ripe for the squaring of some football accounts outstanding since last fall. A half dozen eastern college eleven take the field tomorrow given at least an even chance to avenge defeats they suffered at the hands of the same opposition last fall.

Army's Cadets, well aware that there is no Bruce Caldwell at Yale this year, have high hopes of getting even for a 10-6 defeat last fall. Caldwell threw the pass that enabled Quarrier to score a touchdown against the Cadets. Kicked the extra point and then kicked a field goal to figure directly in every Yale score. But the Army feels that Cagle, Murrell and the rest of the Cadet backfield, backed by a veteran line, can atone for that losing effort with plenty to spare.

Navy Has No Chance
 Navy trimmed Pennsylvania, 12-6, in 1927 but most Annapolis supporters will be content if the Midshipmen finish within two touchdowns of Penn tomorrow. Although beaten by Nebraska, Syracuse is favored to defeat Penn State, which won last year 9-6.

Pitt overwhelmed Carnegie Tech last year, 23-7 but the situation is somewhat different at this moment. Pitt has been beaten by West Virginia and Gibby Welch is missed. Howard Harpster is the Gibby Welch of Carnegie this year.

Doubtful Class
 The Princeton-Cornell and Harvard-Dartmouth games are in the doubtful class. Against three minor opponents, Cornell has appeared to advantage while Princeton has yet to show what it can do against a first-class opponent. The Tigers had their

opportunity against Virginia but Princeton rooters are hoping that that scoreless tie is not indicative of the real strength of Bill Roper's men.

Dartmouth's machine has trampled all opposition underfoot without trouble thus far but Harvard, certainly, may be expected to put up the hardest kind of a fight. Still there are few hardy enough to venture an outright belief that Harvard can avenge the 20-6 beating it took last fall.

At Easton, Pa., there's a clash of two mighty eleven-Lafayette and West Virginia. These two battled to a 7-7 tie last season.

J. McEWAN GOES SOUTH TO LOOK OVER OF U. OF C.

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 26, (AP)—John J. McEwan, University of Oregon football coach, deserted his players here today to take a trip to Berkeley, Calif., to scout the game between the University of California and Olympic club at Berkeley tomorrow. The University of Oregon will play California in a Pacific coast conference contest next week.

While absent from the campus McEwan's squad will be handled by his assistants, Gene Vidai and Dick Reed.

THE DALLES TO MEET MEDFORD ON GRID FIELD

THE DALLES, Ore., Oct. 26, (UP)—The Dalles high school and Medford high school football teams will meet on Murray field here either November 14 or 17, it was announced here today following an exchange of telegrams between officials of the two schools.

The clash will settle a long standing difference of opinion regarding the comparative strength of the two teams. Medford has not lost a game in five years while The Dalles has lost four games in five years to teams outside of Portland.

OREGON STATE LINE-UP TOLD

Eilers Will Captain Team Sophs Placed In Back Field

CORVALLIS, Ore., Oct. 26, (AP)—Vernon Eilers, all-convict guard, will lead the Oregon State College football team into the fray tomorrow against the University of Washington. Eilers was named captain of the squad last night as the team departed for Seattle for the game. Thirty players left for the north, encouraged by a rousing station rally by the student body.

A lineup similar to that which played Washington State in the first half of the game last week will start for Oregon State, coach Schlusler announced. This includes almost a sophomore backfield, as Maple is the only letterman, others being Hughes and Sherwood halves, and Chief Thompson, fullback.

Use of these unseasoned players to start important games is forced by early season injuries of Twitchell and Metten, veteran backs. Twitchell was hurt in early practice and has not played in any conference game this season. He will go to Seattle but probably will not be used, Schlusler says. Starting linemen are Whitlock and Striff, ends, Luce and Stout, tackles; Eilers and Carlson, guards; Geddes, center.

SEATTLE, Oct. 26, (AP)—A rejuvenated and troubled University of Washington football squad was tapering off today in preparation for the Huskies' twenty-second meeting with Oregon State college here tomorrow. The return of three regulars to the squad and constant changing of the first eleven with the almost certain elimination of Captain Clarence Dirks from the starting lineup, apparently have put some fight back into the weakened husky that was unmercifully crushed by the University of Oregon a week ago.
