

CARDS TROJANS GET READY FOR SUPREME TEST

Three California Teams Will Be Under Fire Next Saturday

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 29.—(AP)—The "Triple Entente" of western football has come to a parting of the ways and after a peaceful and joint rule of two weeks, Stanford, Southern California and California decide next Saturday which two or possibly which one will continue to dominate the affairs of the Pacific Coast conference.

Tied for the title the Cards of Stanford and the Trojans of Southern California risk their gridiron chances in one grand sweep at Los Angeles. California also undefeated, gambles with its future standing in a game at Berkeley, against Oregon, but the odds are not so heavy.

75,000 Buy Tickets
From east to west across the country no contest looms above the classic that will bring Stanford and Southern California into action. More than 75,000 persons have long since snapped up the tickets that assure a jammed Coliseum. As many more could be sold if the Stadium could accommodate the throng.

Last year these two eleven played a 13-13 tie and ended the season tied with Idaho for the conference championship. This year one must drop behind unless, of course, they finish in another unexpected tie.

Both had comparatively easy week ends just passed. A team of Stanford reserves rushed over Fresno State by a 47-0 score.

Southern California beat down the resistance of a scrappy occidental squad 19-0.

Olympic Club Wins
California lost to the Olympic club, 12-0, but it was an eleven composed of youngsters that took the bump. Coach "Nibs" Price was content to drop a non-conference game, the first defeat of the season rather than run the risk of losing and regulars for the Oregon engagement.

Oregon has shown plenty of power, despite an early defeat by Stanford, and last Saturday walked over Monmouth Normal 25-0.

Other conference games next Saturday bring together Washington State and Idaho at Moscow and Oregon State and Montana at Corvallis. Idaho eliminated University of California at Los Angeles from further conference consideration last week by a 20-6 score, but is likely to run into trouble with Washington State. The starters galloped off with their practice tilt with College of Idaho, 51-0. Oregon State shattered Washington's hopes, 29-0 last week and should have no trouble with Montana's Grizzlies who were held to a scoreless tie by Montana State.

WHEAT SUPPLY OF CANADA IS SAME AS 1927

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29. (UP)—The Canadian bread wheat supply will be no larger this year than in 1927, Secretary of Agriculture Jardine announced today.
"It is becoming more apparent that frost seriously damaged the Canadian crops," he said, "and dockage is reported to be unusually heavy. Consequently, a large proportion of this year's crop is below contract grade and much more than last year is being classed as feed."
"Inspections of Canadian wheat to date indicates the effective supply of bread wheat from this year's crop will be no larger than from last year's crop."
