CARDS FAVORED OVER TROJANS

Odds Are Ten to Six On
Stanford Grid
Warriors

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 30.—(AP)—Favorites for three years running over Stanford, Southern California has had the odds tables turned on them this season and it looks much like the Trojans footballers will be the underdogs in next Saturday's all-important struggle with the Cardinals.

Odds at present favor "Pop" Warner's team by a margin of almost two to one. Odds of 10 to six are frequently quoted. Nearly everybody is spotting points, one touchdown or a couple. The mathematically inclined gentry line up with the Cardinals, figuring them paper favorites by from one to three touchdowns.

Southern California's followers believe that with the Trojans on the bottom looking up, nothing could be better. They anticipate the change will have a psychological effect. Being underdogs, will serve to key Coach Howard Jones' men up to a fighting pitch that would enable them to do no end of damage, they believe.

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal. Oct. 30.—(AP)—The Stanford football squad went through a strenuous workout in a heavy downpour yesterday in preparation for more of the same thing today, with the weather forecast predicting unsettled weather.

The reverses that form the backbone of the Cardinals attack cannot be executed properly with a wet ball, and unless the weather clears up the sharpness with which the Stanford backs execute their plays may be dulled.

HARD HITTING FIGHTERS ARE READY FOR GO

Benny Dotson and Ray McQuillan Fight Main Event Tonight

CHILQUIN, Oct. 30.—The population of this town has been steadily increasing for the past three days, the influx being due to the coming fight here Tuesday night, October 30, at 8:30 when Benny Dotson and Ray McQuillan meet in the main event of a very fast card.

Dotson is known to every Klamath county boxing fan as a fine piece of fighting machinery, one of the best on the coast. When he fought in Madison Square Garden in New York City several months ago, Damon Runyan, one of the premier sports writers of the country, said, "Dotson is good enough any time for this town, his ten round go tonight was the best on the card."

Ray McQuillan, Oakland's fighting negro with the Irish moniker, has fought all the good boys on the coast that he could get into a ring with him, and had to move north because of the dearth of good opponents in California. This Ray boy is plenty tough and is in line for a main event in Portland in the near future. The Portland sports writers see in him a future contender for the welterweight crown.

In the semi-final, Joe Swindler, Chilquín's fighting chief of police, meets Earl Beebe, a coming youngster from Portland, who is rated with the best of the four round boys in the Rose City. Joe is out for a quick knockout and his supporters think he is good for a fast fight if the bout goes the entire distance. Beebe is undaunted and says he will take Joe for a good trimming. It should be good.

Harold Wright, Young Jerry, Joe Robertson, Mike Francis, and Archie Tucker will meet in the preliminaries. The best one among the preliminaries should be the go between Francis and Tucker. Tucker put up a terrific fight in one of the earlier cards here and should repeat.

A story of how the country's leading college football scorer passed up a chance to boost his own total so a team mate could make a touchdown is told by his coach, Chick McLean. Ken Strong, New York University's great halfback, is the hero.

McLean, "Just before we made our first touchdown we were penalized five yards for taking too long in a huddle. Do you know what was going on in that huddle?"

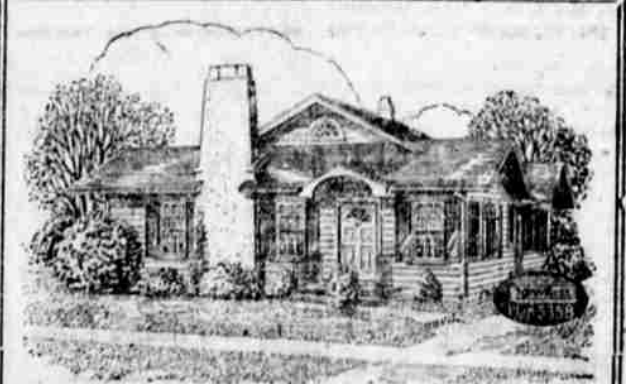
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WHAT OUR NEIGHBORS ARE DOING
