My Dear Mr. Krause:

I am glad to have your letter of October 9th, advising that the city of Klamath Falls is preparing to vote on a bond issue for the purpose of establishing a municipal airport, and wish to take this opportunity to express my appreciation of the interest your city is taking in this project.

Air transportation has emerged from the experimental stage and is taking its place in the commercial and industrial life of the world; and before we hardly realize it, swift aerial carriers will be bearing their cargoes to every corner of the land, with a degree of safety and reliability rivaling the best of our surface carriers.

The importance of the development of municipal airports can not be emphasized too strongly. Every city should possess one or more public airports. In this way only can the permanence of these developments be definitely assured. As time goes on and traffic increases, it will undoubtedly be found profitable to establish private airports, but these can never take the place of the open municipal airport any more than a private speedway can eliminate the necessity for the public highway. Progressive cities throughout the United States are realizing the importance of this matter and are providing themselves with suitable airports in order that they may have a place in the far-flung transportation system that is now taking shape in the skies, and reap the profits of the pioneer.

Vote 100—"Yes"

On proposed Charter Amendment which will be submitted to the Voters at the next General Election.

"Shall the Charter of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, be amended by adding thereto Subdivision 79, Section 87, Article IV, Chapter 3, authorizing the Common Council to issue and sell general obligation bonds of said City to an amount not to exceed FIFTY THOUSAND (\$50,000) DOLLARS, bearing interest at not to exceed five per cent per annum, for the purpose of providing funds for the purchase of land, and the operation, maintenance, construction, erection, installation and establishment of a "MUNICIPAL AIR-PORT" or airplane landing field, in, near, or adjacent to the corporate limits of the said City, and providing for the levy of a special tax to pay the principal and interest on said bonds."
