



VANDALS WILL MEET IDAHO IN HARD STRUGGLE

FULLMAN, Wash., Nov. 1. (AP)—Notwithstanding the fact that the Washington State College Cougars have a far more impressive paper record than the Vandals this season, Coach 'Fabe' Hollingbery is looking for anything to happen when he meets the University of Idaho squad at Moscow Saturday afternoon.

Today Hollingbery continued concentration on the development of a greater offensive power which, he believes will be his best defense against the Vandal

attack. Thus far this week, he has devoted much time to a defense for the bewildering Idaho passing attack of the type used by the Vandals when they defeated the University of California at Los Angeles last Saturday at Moscow. The probability that Idaho will not use the percentage style of game, which last year allowed the Cougars to run the score into a 7-7 tie, has set Hollingbery to work on a new set of tactics.

Soph Halfback of California on First Team

BERKELEY, Nov. 1. (AP)—Coach 'Nibs' Price pulled the surprise of the week at the football practice of the University of California yesterday, when he announced that Clarence Garrity, sophomore halfback, will start at half in place of Stan Barr against the University of Oregon Saturday.

Garrity, who hails from Twin Falls, Idaho, made his first lengthy appearance as a Bear Grubber in the Olympic club game last week. He turned in a fine game on defense, punted well, and hit the line hard and it is probably on the basis of this performance that he was given the call for Saturday's game.

The remainder of the California lineup was announced as Captain Phillips and Avery, ends; Bancroft and Fitz, tackles; Schwarz and Koch, guards; Regels, center; Eban, quarter; Lom at the other halfback post, and Schmidt, fullback.

The California team will hold its last stiff practice of the week today, and will only go through a light workout tomorrow, to polish up before the important conference engagement of Saturday.

Trojans Ready for Cardinals

Howard Jones Will Send In First Team Intact

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 1. (AP)—Coach Howard Jones expected today to send his first team intact into the Stanford game here Saturday, for the first time since the Trojan Glidders tackled St. Mary's three weeks ago.

Nathan Barrager, first team center took the field again last night after spending three days in the hospital with an injured hip and a slight case of flu.

The other Trojan players who have been ailing but who are anticipating action Saturday are Captain Jesse Hibbs, Charlie Boren, Harry Edelson and Lowry McCaslin. Hibbs suffered a cold at the beginning of the week but has been working out since Tuesday.

Boren returned to the lineup this week after a long lay-off caused by injured knees. He is first string running guard.

Edelson, experienced halfback, hurt his ankle two weeks ago and has been favoring it since, although he has participated in light work-outs. Lowry McCaslin, promising varsity end, is thought to be himself again after having his knee injured.

With these men back in position, Jones has proceeded with his plan of shifting Captain Hibbs to end on offense to give more power to his power plays. When Hibbs goes to end, Jess Shaw works at his left tackle position. On defense, Hibbs returns to tackle. Shaw moves over to running guard and Charlie Boren goes out to end.

ROCKNE'S ACE OUT OF GAME

COLLEGE BOYS TOO SMART FOR CAFETERIA MAN

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 1. (UP)—The old question of the value of a college education versus ordinary business acumen was put to the test here today.

The business acumen part of it was demonstrated by a local cafeteria proprietor who placed this announcement in his window:

"Every twenty-fifth customer eats free."

The academic side was taken care of by a small group of college boys in front of the cafeteria. The leader had a small pair of field glasses turned on the cashier. In his other hand he held an automatic counter.

Every 25th customer for over an hour was an undergraduate, and every 25th tray had been piled sky-high.

From the look on the proprietor's face, it appeared that the college education proponents had won at least a temporary decision.

In Reply To E. J. Murray

I wish to reply to the advertisement in this paper by E. J. Murray, in opposition to my candidacy for County Commissioner.

Mr. Murray was formerly editor of The Herald, and, at different times, opposed and supported me, when I ran for office. He is opposing me at this election because I favored a re-cruise of the county's timber, which has resulted in more than a million and a half dollars increase in the tax roll, so that it was possible to reduce the county taxes by a mill this year.

I don't want to engage in personalities with former Editor Murray, but I think I know what is causing him to run these ads against me, and it is not timber taxation. No sane property owner would object to having the timber of the county cruised at its true quantity, so that it can be properly taxed, before it is all cut off, and Mr. Murray is a very large property owner in Klamath Falls.

If all Mr. Murray has against me is that I have fought through thick and thin, and in the face of all manner of discouragement, and sometimes abuse, for FAIR taxation of the timber of the county, with the result, as stated, that this year \$1,500,000 in tax valuation has been taken off the back of the home-owner, the wage-earner, the farmer and the business man, and placed on timber, where it rightfully belongs, I am not afraid of the people's verdict, on November sixth.

On the other hand, if former Editor Murray has something else in mind, I am ready to meet him on the true reason for his attack on me, which, I repeat, is not timber taxation.

The people of Klamath Falls and Klamath county have not forgotten that Murray, when he ran the Herald, fought the Big Lakes Box company when they wanted to close some street ends and enlarge their plant, in order to provide a larger payroll for Klamath Falls. Just the day before

he ran his ad against me in this paper, Murray ran an ad against Fred Cofer for Mayor, and gave as his reason for it that Cofer, when a Klamath Falls councilman, favored the Big Lakes street closing.

Murray is trying to carry water on both shoulders. He runs an ad one day against Cofer because Cofer favored the Big Lakes, while he runs an ad against me the next day because, he says, I have not favored the lumber industries. The trouble with Murray is, that he is trying to beat too many men. He is trying to dictate too much Klamath Falls and Klamath county politics from Coos county, where he now lives, and runs a newspaper. Murray reminds me of the old fable of the dog crossing the water with the bone. When the dog grabbed into the water for the bone he saw there, he lost the bone he was carrying. I don't believe the people of Klamath Falls and Klamath county are willing to let Murray select their mayor or county commissioner for them, from Coos Bay, where he now lives.

In closing, let me say, that I have never been opposed to industries, or pay rolls. To see that all property pays its fair share of taxes, is not opposing legitimate industry. In contrast with Editor Murray's opposition to the Big Lakes, just two years ago I did everything I could to get a better road into the Big Lakes camp, which was then logging for Ewauna, as well as for themselves. A. J. Voye came before the county court with a petition for a better road and I was the only member of the court that stood for the improvement. I felt then, as I feel now, that whenever it can be legitimately done, the lumber industry and the other pay rolls of the county should be fostered and built up.

On the other hand, I doubt if Mr. Murray can show a single instance in the whole time that he lived here, when he cooperated with the lumber industry or with any one, for that matter, to accomplish a single constructive purpose. Mr. Murray's whole history was destructive, and it is destructive now.

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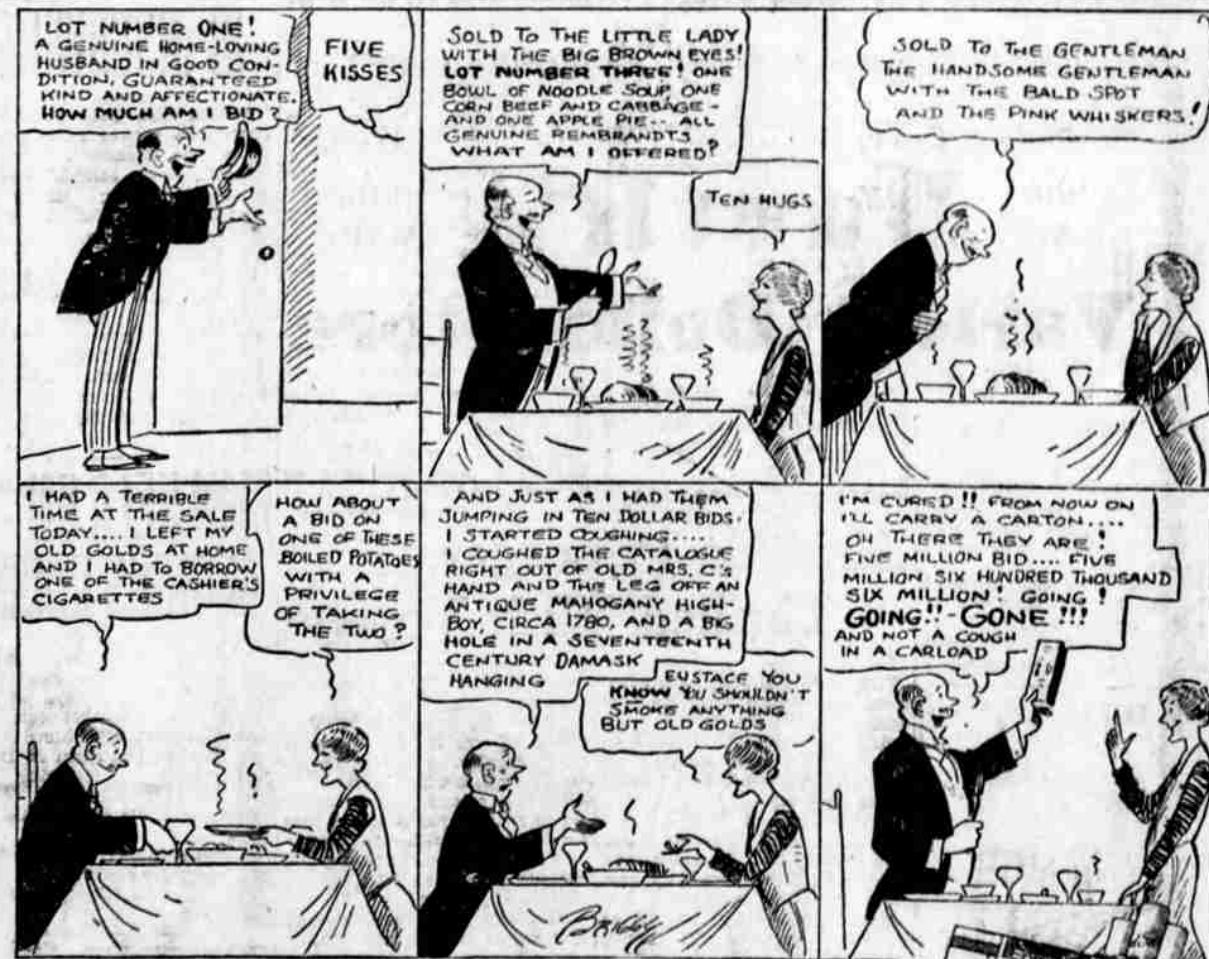
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
