



## O. Von Porat Rallies Hard but Loses Nod

NEW YORK, Nov. 6. (AP)—O. Von Porat's upward progress in the heavyweight division has been checked temporarily at least by that rock of the Pyrenees, Paulino Uscudun.

The Norwegian, who has been cutting a wide swath in middle western flistic circles, found it was easier to hit Paulino than to floor him and consequently dropped a ten round decision before 15,000 customers at Madison Square Garden.

As a matter of fact all the flooring that was done last night was done by Paulino. The basque woodchopper caught Von Porat's long chin with a jolting right in the first round and dropped the Norwegian to the canvas for a count of nine. The process was repeated again in the fifth round.

Von Porat waited until the last round to demonstrate the paralyzing power of his punch. He caught Paulino flush with several right hand punches that staggered the Spaniard as he never has been staggered before. Only a jaw as durable as Paulino's could have withstood the effects of those few blows, as it was Paulino was glad to hang on as much as possible and wait for the bell. That round and the fourth, however, were all that Von Porat won, according to the Associated Press score sheet. All the others went to Paulino.

Tiny Roebuck, 240-pound Choctaw Indian, made an inauspicious New York debut. He was knocked out in a single round by Arthur DeKuh, big New York Italian.

## Young Fighter Badly Hurt in Bitter Battle

CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—(AP)—Billy Showers, youthful St. Paul middleweight boxer, was believed to be in a critical condition today, suffering from either concussion of the brain, a hemorrhage of a fracture at the base of the brain, as the result of a vicious ring battle with Shuffle Callahan of Chicago.

After absorbing a terrific punishment in the scheduled 10 round bout at White City last night, Showers collapsed and fell unconscious in the sixth round. After physicians had worked for 45 minutes attempting to revive him, a pulmotor squad from a nearby fire department was called but it also failed. He then was taken to a hospital.

Callahan had several stitches taken over his eye to close a bad wound suffered in the fight and then was taken into custody under no charge by the police, pending outcome of Showers' injuries.

At the hospital, Showers was in a semi-comatose condition and repeated that his head was buzzing and very sore.

Dave Barry, referee of the bout and promoter Mique, were taken along with Callahan to the Woodlawn Avenue section, but released after a few minutes questioning.

Former Laundry Workers, Now Millionaires, Touring World on Belated Honeymoon

ARKANSAS CITY, Kas., Nov. 6.—Love will always find a way. Thirty years ago Mrs. Laura Altom, a young widow with two small sons to support, worked in the little Empire laundry here. It was owned by C. N. Hunt, mayor and postmaster for 18 years.

One of the settlers in Oklahoma's famous Cherokee strip, C. C. Endicott, came along, married her, and took her to his newly-claimed farm, where with her meager savings they bought an additional 160 acres of farm land.

Times continued hard, however. To hold the land they had bought Mrs. Endicott had to run a hand laundry, and she and her husband and her two sons went through many long years of very hard work. The land was not very good, and while they would gladly have sold it they could find no buyers.

Then in 1921 they found themselves plopped into one of Oklahoma's traditional fairy tales. The Comar Oil company leased Mrs. Endicott's land, and struck a gusher of prodigious size. For three years she enjoyed an income of more than \$5000 a day; in a short time the family moved to California and began to enjoy their new riches. They were millionaires, several times over.

A year ago Mr. Endicott died, and the woman was again a widow.

Thirty years ago a young man worked in the little Empire laundry here—one Dave C. Twedell. He and the young widow were sweethearts. They might have

married had not some turn of fate separated them; and when she married Endicott, Twedell moved to Arizona, where he too was married.

A year ago Mrs. Twedell died. Recently Mrs. Endicott changed to pass through Phoenix, Ariz. There she met her old friend, Dave Twedell. They fell in love all over again—and not long ago they were married by a minister who had also been a fellow-worker in the Empire laundry thirty years ago.

Now they're on their honeymoon—a round-the-world trip, via Hawaii.

## New Legion Chief Didn't Get to France

BLOOMINGTON, Ind., Nov. 6.—The new national commander of the American Legion is one of those unhappy Americans whose services during the World War were highly essential but not at all spectacular or exciting.

Colonel Paul V. McNutt, the 37-year-old chief of the soldiers' organization, knew too much about field artillery for his own good. Because of his knowledge the army authorities kept him at San Antonio, Texas, where he just won election to the Legion's highest office, training artillery units. He was considered one of the foremost theoretical field artillery instructors in the country—and that was just his hard luck.

Colonel McNutt is youthful to be a national commander; but then, he has traveled far for his years in other ways, too. He is dean of the Indiana University School of Law, and has been granted a year's leave of absence from that post to carry on the duties of his new Legion office. He won the appointment three years ago, having the distinction of being the youngest man ever made a dean at Indiana.

Born in Martinsville, Ind., in 1891, McNutt studied at Indiana University, graduating in 1913, and went to Harvard to study law. He finished his law course in 1916, returned to Indiana to become an assistant professor of law, and on the outbreak of the war joined the army, receiving his training and commission as artillery captain at Fort Benning, Harrison.

## WASHINGTON D.C. WANTS TO VOTE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6. (AP)—While millions of American citizens are casting their ballots throughout the country in tomorrow's election, the half million residents of the District of Columbia will be represented in a demonstration of protest against their inability to exercise the electoral privilege.

A constitutional amendment to provide the voting privilege for the residents of the district who at present are voteless has been proposed by a committee of the district's residents, headed by Theodore W. Noyes, editor of the Washington Star.

Characterized as Washington's "Day of Humiliation," the national capital's appeal for the voting franchise will include the taking of moving pictures for national representation of a float decorated to show its voteless condition in front of the White House, while a squadron of airplanes will fly over the city carrying a number of debaters who will drop balloons displaying the slogan "Give Washington National Representation." A group of prominent Washington women also will place locked ballot boxes on the principal street intersections.
