DRYS JUBILANT OVER VICTORY

WESTERVILLE, Ohio, Nov. 7. (AP)—Dr. Ernest H. Cherrington, general secretary of the World League Against Alcohol, in a formal statement today declared that the election of Herbert Hoover as president "in some respects marks the greatest prohibition victory ever achieved."

Hoover's victory, Dr. Cherrington claimed, "indicates that the American people are desirous of keeping prohibition in the constitution and laws of the United States." He said that the victory for prohibition is shown not only in the election of Hoover through winning a sufficient number of electoral votes, but "what is even more to the point, by the heavy popular vote he received in states where his vote was not strong enough to give him electoral votes."

It was the relief of the dry leader that election of Hoover will have a decided effect on the prohibition and temperance movement in some other nations. "Had the result been otherwise," he declared, "the rest of the nations, which are looking to America for leadership, would have been persuaded that the United States was tired of prohibition, and the vote would have shown that the majority of the American people prohibition was unsatisfactory."

Education was held by Dr. Cherrington to be the chief future work of the temperance forces.

Two tiny children, a girl aged 3 and a boy only a year older, attempted to aid their mother in evading officers yesterday by dumping moonshine whiskey out of the bottoms of two gallon jugs which their mother smashed when officers stopped her car near the city, according to the story told by officers.

The efforts of the children failed, and as a result the officers have evidence which they may use to convict Mrs. Jack Hemmingsway of possession and transportation of intoxicating liquor. She will appear before Justice of the Peace W. B. Barnes today to answer the charge.

She was arrested by Officers Louis Mueller, deputy sheriff, and H. R. England, special officer.

Mueller stated that when he attempted to stop her car she tried to run him into the ditch by the side of the road.

Deputy United States Marshal Cal Wells arrested F. E. Everett, 319 Upham street, and he will face a federal charge of possession and sale of intoxicating liquors to Indians. Officers stated that while the Indian was at the house buying the evidence that the phone kept ringing and those who called warned Everett that officers were nearby ready to arrest him after he made the sale. He will also face a charge of maintaining a nuisance.
