

Klamath And Bend Football Teams Will Meet On Grid Field Armistice Day

INVADERS HAVE NOT SUFFERED ONE SET BACK

K. U. H. S. Primed for Big Game at Fair Grounds Monday Afternoon

Two leading football teams of central and south central Oregon, will settle the age-old question of supremacy when Klamath High and Bend High school meet Monday afternoon in an Armistice Day clash on Fair Grounds field.

Both teams have exemplary records. Bend has not yet suffered defeat while Klamath has won five out of its six games, to date. The Klamath gridsters suffered a set back at the hands of the powerful Medford eleven. However they managed to hold the great Rogue River valley aggregation to the lowest score of the season.

Coach Sinclair's gritty players have defeated Ashland twice, Grants Pass, Alturas and Dunsmuir.

JOHN FRANCIS, BENNY DOTSON TO MEET 15TH

Two Clever and Slugging Fighters Will Clash In Main Event

When Johnnie Francis, Klamath's shock-punch king, and Benny Dotson, hard punching game-cock, tangle in the main event of the November 15 boxing card, Klamath fans will see one of the sweetest fights staged in Klamath for many a day.

In reach and height and punch, these boys are about on a par; if anything, Johnnie has the advantage in punch, and Dotson will weigh in several pounds heavier. At ringside Francis is expected to weigh in at 135 or 136 pounds; Dotson will train down to somewhere between 136 and 138.

In style of fighting, both fighters are ideally matched. They are aggressive, two fisters and courageous. In addition they are clever, fast and capable of putting up a good defense.

After Dotson fought in Chiliquin recently, Francis went to Tex Bickerstaff, promoter, and announced that he "wanted a crack at Dotson".

The only fly in the ointment was the question of weight and between the two boys, this was quickly arranged.

Dotson said he would come down in weight; Francis said he would come up.

"Besides," Francis pointed out, "I'd just as soon give him a few pounds."

Since his fight with Riley, Francis has been very anxious to show his fistie wares in Klamath again. In Dotson, he will meet a man who will swap punch for punch from the first round to the tenth.

For several years, southern Oregon fight fans have been reading of the sensational fights of Teddy Fox, Salem boy, who, start out as a preliminary boy, has already paved his way over the rough road of fistie battles to the semi-windup position.

Fox will meet Eddie Graham of Portland, known as the wild-cat, in the six-round semi-windup. Four preliminary bouts are yet to be announced.

Andy Lotshaw, trainer of the Chicago Cubs, also acts in that capacity for the Bears, professional football team. In the fall and winter, Andy was anxious to know whether one of the baseball radio announcers was going to broadcast the football games and wondered if he knew his stuff in both games.

"If 'Circus Solly' Hoffman of the old Chicago Cubs did the announcing it would go about like this," said Andy.

"The Bears win the toss and kick off with two men left on bases. The Cardinals receive the ball on their own 15 yard line and steal third base by clever open field running. There are two strikes and three balls on the batter with 15 yards to go. The Bears try a forward pass, which the right fielder loses in the sun and are thrown out at first on a close play. The Cardinals hit a home run on a change of pace ball, only to be stopped on the Bears' 20 yard line as the second baseman makes a great catch of a scorching drop kick. The score is 3 to 2—at the end of the third quarter. With two out in the seventh inning, the Bears take out their pitcher, putting in a quarterback from the bull pen, who is freely hit each time for a four-yard loss.

"The Bears' cheering section gives their college yells and shower the referee and umpire with pop bottles and flasks. The next man flies out and Sternaman of the Bears puts the balls over the home plate on an off-tackle play.

"The whistle blows for the end of the fourth quarter, leaving the score 12 to 8 after eleven hard fought innings, which require ten pitchers and seventeen pinch hitters."

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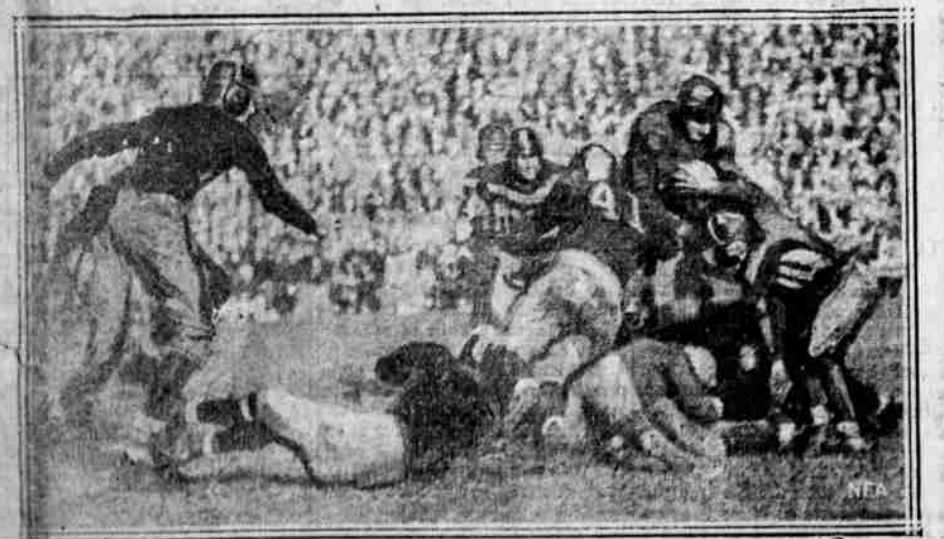
