Twenty-Three Members of Oklahoma Squad Laud Up After Clash

NORMAN, Okla., Nov. 12. (AP)—Battered and bruised so badly in last week's crushing 6 to 44 defeat by Nebraska's powerful gridiron machine, 23 members of the Oklahoma football squad were unable to report for practice last night. Only one member of the first or second string teams showed up on the field, causing virtual cancellation of the Monday night's workout. None of the 23 players was hurt seriously, but Coach Ed Lindsay believed it would take most of them two weeks to "get over their bruises."

BENSON BEATS WASHINGTON HI

Orange Tide Immerses Strong Portland Eleven Yesterday

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 12. (AP)—A strong incoming orange tide representing the Benson polytechnic school submerged the mighty Washington high eleven, 6 to 0, here yesterday in the Armistice Day game of the Portland Interscholastic League race.

The Orange gridders started a sweeping attack on the Colonials at the kick-off and continued the onslaught until the final whistle blew.

The Techmen's score came in the first few minutes of the first quarter when a bad pass from the Washington center was fumbled, and a mechanic back recovered the ball on the 20-yard line. The score was made on straight line plunges.

Late in the second quarter, the Mechanics pushed the ball up to the goal line, but the Colonials held for four straight downs, getting possession of the ball on their 4-yard line.

Washington opened up an aerial attack in the fourth quarter, but it proved ineffective as the Mechanics broke them up. Trick plays were tried by the Washingtonians but they too, proved fruitless.

Modern Fuel Burner To Be Sold In City

Through a contract closed with Griffith & Co. of Portland, agents for sawdust and "Hog" furnace burners, Peyton & Co. will be distributors for Klamath county, according to announcement made today by Oscar Peyton.

Installation and demonstration of one of the burners at the Peyton residence on Sunday "sold" the burner to Mr. Peyton, who believes it will be the means of saving considerable money to people of this vicinity.

Fuel for the burner, a self-feeder, which feeds into the furnace by gravity, will be furnished by a Klamath mill to Peyton & Co. within thirty days' time.

The burner, Mr. Peyton believes, will be far less expensive, much more convenient and much cleaner. The furnace can be closed for hours, and still the feeder continues, keeping the home warm without any attention.

BEGIN MOVE TO FREE T. MOONEY

NEW YORK, Nov. 12. (AP)—A new nation-wide campaign to free Tom Mooney and Warren Billings, serving life sentences in California prisons for alleged participation in the preparedness day bomb explosion at San Francisco in 1916, will be launched Friday under the auspices of the American Civil Liberties union.

In a letter calling upon "Liberals" of the nation to rally to the Mooney-Billings cause, the organization points out that Franklia Riffin, trial judge who sentenced the men, has told Governor Young of California that he is now convinced of their innocence.
