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AIMEE DENIES BRIBE CHARGES

"Not A Word of Truth in The Suggestion," Says Evangelist

BRISTOL, England, Nov. 13. (UP)—Mrs. Aimee Semple McPherson, California evangelist who has been touring England, denied today charges that \$800,000 had been spent to quash a conspiracy case against her in California.

"There is not a word of truth in the suggestion made in California," she said. "It is some political dodge by some party that wants to out Asa Keyes (Los Angeles prosecutor) and would make a football out of anyone who happens to be in the road."

"I never paid a penny. The reason I was freed was that the woman who made charges against me confessed she had lied and had been hired to tell the story. If Ormiston (alleged to have been Mrs. McPherson's companion during her 'disappearance') had told the truth his testimony would have favored me."

As near as authorities can ascertain, Barkley was lying on the floor of a barn, unconscious when somebody came up to him with a six-foot iron bar and beat him to death. His head was badly mutilated and his body showed signs of attack.

Clements, in a statement an

later in testimony given at the coroner's jury, placed responsibility for the crime on George. Clements claimed he heard George say he "was going back and kill the..." Clements then said he followed George back toward the barn where Barkley was lying on the floor, unconscious, pleading with him to desist. As he reached the barn, Clements said, he saw George raise the long piece of iron and strike Barkley on the head.
