

BROADCASTING STATION URGED

To seek further particulars on the possibility of a broadcasting station being hooked up in Klamath Falls through the National Broadcasting station of Seattle, directors of the chamber of commerce today instructed Earl Reynolds, secretary, to write manager C. A. Berger of K. P. Q. at Seattle.

The National Broadcasting station recently wrote the local chamber to learn whether or not this city would be interested in establishing a station in Klamath Falls.

Chambers of commerce at Medford, Grants Pass and Ashland will be asked to speak in behalf of the Klamath Gem potatoes, while Klamath Falls in turn will favor the use of garden supplies from the valley cities.

Two new members of the chamber of commerce, Mr. Nixon and Mr. Haley, both representatives of the Southern Oregon Oil company were special guests of the directors today. Both gentlemen in brief messages expressed pleasure at being in the Klamath country and of their willingness to assist the chamber of commerce whenever possible.

In the absence of H. N. Moe, president, Fred Fleet presided over the meeting today.

BERMUDA, Nov. 13. (AP)—One of the lifeboats of the stricken liner Vestris was picked up empty by the liner Berlin this morning. There was no way to tell whether it had been occupied and the passengers were lost or whether it had washed away from the Vestris unoccupied.

STORM SINKS LARGE VESSEL

had apparently resulted in the saving of nearly all those who yesterday took to lifeboats when the steamer Vestris turned over 300 miles off the Virginia coast.

Almost a dozen boats ranging from battleship to cutter, cruised the waves through the night in response to frantic distress signals and early in the morning had picked up six small boats and a raft bearing all but a few of the 223 passengers and sailors who had left the Vestris with its deck awash.

Of the humanity-burdened craft that put away from the sinking vessel shortly after noon, yesterday when it reported itself lying on its beam ends, only an improvised craft was believed missing this morning. Search for it continued with the battleship Wyoming reporting that she had rescued other persons from floating wreckage.

In all the messages that flew from ship to shore telling of the rescue, there was no mention of whether there was loss of life. Although it was not possible during the early hours to determine the exact number of those saved, it was supposed that all had either crowded aboard the life boats and rafts or had clung to the wreckage come upon by the rescue fleet. Some believed that because of the 32 degree tilt of the ship's deck, supposed caused by shifting of her cargo, only the five boats on the high side and possibly one of those at the stern could be launched when the order to abandon was given.

Those who waited through the night to read the drama-laden wireless messages that pictured the disaster, were hopeful that all the ship's personnel had left her when the lifeboats were lowered away. They took additional comfort from the fact that Captain Cary of the Vestris was one of those picked up, and from the knowledge that the law of the sea makes the master the last to leave.

The hurrying rescue craft reached the scene of the sinking ship during the early hours of the night but they searched in vain until just before dawn when the first contact with the drifting survivors was made.

At half past three came the first hopeful word. At that hour, the steamship American Shipper sent out a message saying that red flares had been sighted. The communication was intercepted by the Naval Radio station here and by the Radio Marine corporation at New York.

A tense half hour followed. At four o'clock the American Shipper reported that the first life boat had been found and was along side. The vessel's radio message said: "Now on scene. One life boat along side us now."

Just a little while later a second rescue vessel, the Oil Tanker Myriam, sent out word that it too, had located a life boat and a little later still told of others in the offering. A message from the Myriam to the steamship Sunewego urged that that vessel hurry to the thick of the hunt, it said: "Come on, more boats to pick up. Am bound New York myself. Have rescued boat No. 5."

Another message from the American Shipper was the next to be received. It went on the air shortly after five o'clock and said: "About five miles north of position where found first life boat. Approaching four other life boats now."

And then, at 5:40 the American Shipper summed up what she and the Myriam had accomplished in a report to the battleship Wyoming which said that between the two, they had accounted for five life boats and one raft. The survivors in three of the life boats were taken aboard the American Shipper while the Myriam cared for the rest. The message was relayed by the Wyoming to naval communication at Washington.

HARVEST SEED OF BLUE GRASS

The first harvest of blue grass seed in the state of Oregon, has been taken from a Klamath farm.

Twenty acres of the rich forage crop on the Caledonia ranch of George Stevenson—ten miles northwest of Klamath Falls—yielded 2500 pounds of seed. By ingenious use of a combine harvester, Mr. Stevenson, aided by E. A. Geary, simplified the process of harvesting the seed crop.

G. R. Hyslop, farm crops specialist of the Oregon State college, said that the Stevenson blue grass harvest was the first in the state of Oregon. Insofar as the agricultural extension department of the college was able to ascertain.

Another significant step in Klamath agriculture was taken on the Geary ranch where, what is believed to be the first timothy and clover crop to be harvested in Klamath county, yielded a good return.

ADVERTISE FOR ROAD PROJECT

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 13. (AP)—After nearly a year of watchful waiting the state highway commission today began functioning as of yore.

The projects are:

Grading the Harper-Burrell ranch section, 15.4 miles, of the central Oregon highway; grading the Dairy-Lorenz mill section, 8.4 miles, of the Klamath Falls-Lakeview highway, and surfacing the Launka ranch-Albee section, 11.7 miles, of the Pendleton-John Day highway.

TWO BATTLERS IN GOOD SHAPE FOR BIG FIGHT

Benny Dotson and John Francis Train Faithfully for Thursday Clash

Francis is not worrying about his punch, that's tucked away in the bag until the opening gong. But he is concentrating on faster footwork combined with timing.

For this purpose, Francis has sought the services of Benny Dyson, flashy bantam, and Sammy Gordon, erstwhile fighter if bygone days. Dyson is a flash and Gordon, erstwhile fighter of bywork, Francis is tussling with Mike Daly, Pelican City fighter. Johnnie is doing his training at the Pelican City community club.

Last night Francis battled ten fast rounds with these three boxers. The gloves flew thick and fast from beginning to end and at the finish, Francis was hardly breathing heavily. He's in great shape.

Benny Dotson is working out every afternoon in the Vets arena with Cliff Hottinger, Battling Cross and Ned Dotson.

Benny is a great favorite in Klamath. His style of fighting which is straight forward with both hands swinging, appeals to the fistic appetite of Klamath fans. He is training down to 135 for the mix with Francis, while the latter is boosting his weight to about 135. Both scrappers are about the same size, have the same weight, and have dynamite in each glove.

Teddy Fox of Salem, a boy with a punch and a heart, will clash with a clever fighter in Wildcat Eddie Graham of Portland in the six-round semi-wind-up.

Battling Leach Cross, who won his first start in Chilquin, is curious to know whether he has the stuff to continue the fight game. So Tex Hickstaff has matched him with a tough boy in the person of Roy Rose. Cross displayed a clever straight left and a willingness to mix.

Other preliminaries will be announced tomorrow.

BEND DEFEATS KLAMATH HIGH

Invaders Victorious Monday By Margin of One Point

In a game featured by sterling fighting qualities of Klamath High, Bend high school defeated Klamath Union high school on Fair Grounds field by the narrow margin of one point. The final score was 7 to 6.

Outweighed by the Bend team and at a further disadvantage because of a slow field, Klamath fought grimly through four quarters of mud and slush and in the closing minutes of a grueling struggle scored a touchdown on a forward pass.

The try for the extra point went wild. Bend scored a touchdown in the first half and converted, giving it the margin of victory.

In defeat, Klamath high looked better to close observers than it has at any time in the season. With a light team compared to Bend, the K. U. H. S. gridders dug their cleats into the mud and staved off offense after offense of the heavier Deschutes county grid warriors.

Bend has not yet met defeat this season.

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BLAME BURNER FOR MILL FIRE

Further details of the Long Pine Lumber mill fire late Sunday night revealed that the fire, in all probability, originated from the burner.

Sunday night a brisk wind was blowing from the south. The burner is east and south of the mill. Apparently, a gust of wind caught a shower of sparks which, before they had died down, were blown beside the mill.

Once the blaze got under way, there was no stopping it. Fanned by a stiff wind, the plant went up in flames. The wonder is, according to reports, that the mill yard and other buildings were saved.

The mill is owned by G. C. Lorenz who, with his brother Pete Lorenz, was in Portland at the time of the fire. The loss is only partially covered with insurance. The amount of insurance is \$45,000 issued by the Jas. H. Driscoll Insurance company, M. L. Johnson Insurance company and Austin Hayden Insurance company.

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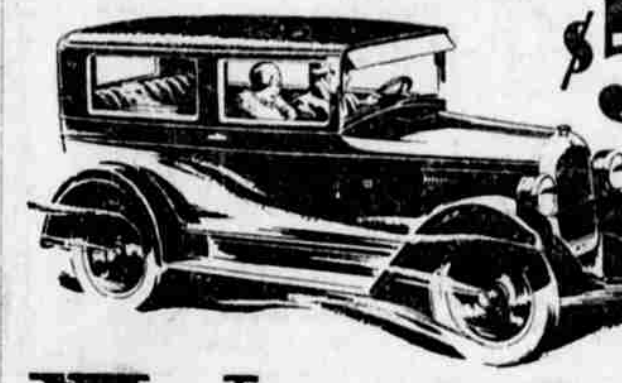
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
