BENNY DOTSON KNOCKED COLD BY J. FRANCIS

Curly Headed Portlander Unable to Withstand Stunning Shock Punches of Klamath Fighter; Fox Awarded Decision Over Graham; Daly and Bennett Fight Draw

Be he champion or dub, the fighter who makes the mistake of trying to stop one of Johnnie Francis' shock punches with his chin, might just as well give up the pugilistic ghost.

Benny Dotson made that tactical error last night and was knocked colder than a shark's eye in the third round of a scheduled ten round main event in the Vets' arena.

Dotson expressed the feelings of the crowd when he muttered to his brother several minutes after the coup de grace:

"That can hit." And how he hit! The right uppercut that dropped the game Portlander for the count of nine in the third actually lifted Dotson off the floor. He fell face first, and the wonder is that he ever arose. But he did, only to receive another one of those deadly shock punches that sent him tottering forward to the canvas for the count of ten—it could have been 20 or 30, despite the fact that Dotson was trying his best to get up.

Benny Leads at First The curly haired Benny was leading the first two rounds; not by a mile but by a clear margin. Early in the first he turned Francis half around with a sizzling right hook and then jolted and staggered Johnnie in a corner.

But a forecast of what was to come was seen in the last second of the first round when Francis, backed up in the corner, crossed a short right to Benny's jaw. Then the bell rang and Benny, clearly dazed, made an uncertain trip to his corner.

The second round was Dotson's by a shade. He connected solidly with hard rights and lefts to the head. But in the latter part of this round, too, Francis suddenly shot over a stunning right that jolted the game youth from head to heel.

Francis Cool Up to this time, Francis, cool and deliberate, had been awaiting an opening. Occasionally his right would snap out like a whip lash but for the most part he was content to use a strong left and weather the Dotsonian storm for the time being.

Came then the third round. Almost imperceptibly, the cool Francis began to speed up. The fight moved at a faster clip. Suddenly, near a neutral corner, Francis crossed a hard right which landed high up on Dotson's left cheek.

The blow apparently staggered the Portlander. They went into a half-clinch, and it was while milling around at close quarters that Francis chopped another jarring right, this time squarely to the point of the chin.

Dotson Groggy Dotson bent far over and whirled away from Francis. In this strange posture he ran half-way across the ring holding his glove against his jaw and shaking his head to clear away the cobwebs—he was punch "groggy".

As cool and calculating as a man working out a geometrical problem, Francis followed up his man.

Dotson whirled back to the fray. A few blows exchanged and then, Bam! Francis came up with a terrific right uppercut that caught Benny just above the point of the chin.

Falls Face Forward Face forward he fell, with a thump that could be heard in the furthestmost corners of the arena. Mustering forth his last ounce of courage and determination, the game curly headed fighter from the Rose city, climbed slowly to unwilling feet.

Francis advanced, side stepped and then, coolly measuring his

MANY CRUCIAL GAMES ON LIST FOR SATURDAY

Notre Dame Will Meet
Carnegie Tech on
Home Field

NEW YORK, Nov. 16. (AP)—Notre Dame's defeat of Army has brought the game with Carnegie at South Bend to the front rank for the Tartans from Pittsburgh have not been stopped. The followers of Rockne and his fighting come-back team have to go back 23 years to find a record of a Notre Dame defeat in the Hoosier habitat, and many believe it cannot be done.

The Pittsburgh eleven has not defeated Notre Dame at South Bend but it turned the trick on its own grounds. Coach Rockne was looking at another football game when his team lost its last clash with Carnegie.

There is a distinct intersectional flavor to the card. In addition to the Carnegie-Notre Dame affair, Pitt goes out to Lincoln to try to demonstrate it is still a good touchdown better than Nebraska. Every indication points to this being a man-sized job.

Detroit, undefeated against fairly sturdy opposition, plays Fordham at the polo grounds of New York while Missouri is taking on New York university at the neighboring Yankee stadium. If Fordham should prove the first to dent the armor of the Titans everyone connected with the Maroon institution would be willing to call it a season. Missouri's Tigers are conceded no more than an outside chance against the powerful N. Y. U. crowd.

In the far west there is a matter of state's rights to be decided between California and Washington with California perhaps in better position. Stanford will play the University of Washington while Southern California meets Washington State. The returns last year were in favor of the Californians. The University of California is favored over Nevada.

An All-State battle between the University of Oregon and the Oregon Aggies seems a "natural", with the result in doubt until the end of the game and perhaps even after that.

In the east, Yale and Princeton have no monopoly on the traditional rivalry spotlight. Williams and Amherst, Harvard and Holy Cross, Rutgers and Lehigh, Columbia and Penn., Colgate and Syracuse, Cornell and Dartmouth, Penn. State and Lafayette, and Georgetown and West Virginia are not strangers.

ROOSEVELT AND GRANT BATTLE TO MUDDY TIE

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 16. (U P)—Grant high and Roosevelt high battled to a scoreless tie on the Multnomah civic stadium gridiron yesterday. A drizzling rain which made footing uncertain prevented either team from trying many trick plays.

Jefferson and Commerce will play today and a victory for Commerce will virtually clinch the championship. Only Grant high which tackles Commerce next week in the final week's play of the Portland interscholastic league, can prevent the stenogs from winning the title.
