SKIING BEGINS AT MOUNT HOOD

Thermometer Past Freezing and Snow Comparatively Deep at Camp

SANDY, Ore., Nov. 19. (UP)—With clear weather, six inches of snow and a thermometer just below freezing, winter sports began at government camp the latter part of last week.

Many Sandy residents along the loop enjoyed the first skiing on the comparatively low lands. Up to this time, there had been sufficient snow only near the timber line for tobogganing, etc. The snow is general, with five inches at Frog Lake. It extends as low as twin bridges.

From 8 to 10 inches of snow is reported on Bennett pass. Motorists are advised to use chains before attempting the loop but need not use them until they reach the highest portions of the loop.

The fog which enveloped Portland today was local. Sandy district and Mount Hood were in bright sunshine, the mountain being the more dazzling because of the new snow.

Oregon State Prepares For Trip to East

CORVALLIS, Ore., Nov. 19. (AP)—With its conference season completed ahead of all other members of the circuit, Oregon State grid squad began today a final four-day preparation for a trip to the east coast where the Beavers meet the powerful New York University in a Thanksgiving day battle.

Coach Schisler let regulars rest today but put all reserves through a scrimmage session.

Twitell, halfback, injured in the Oregon game Saturday, had a bad knee thrown out again and will be unable to make the trip east as planned. The only other injuries were Charlie Horses for Metten and Maple and are not expected to handicap them for the coming sectional game.

Maple, flashy quarter, left today for Peoria, Illinois, ahead of his team mates, to attend the funeral of his father who was killed in an accident a few days prior to the Oregon game.

Duplicating Chinese architecture, Chinese decorations, and other details of creating an exact duplicate of the mysterious Orient proved one of the strangest tasks of research ever encountered at a studio, when the spectacular settings for "Mr. Wu," Lon Chaney's new starring vehicle, now at the Liberty Theatre, were created.

The experts in charge of the work, before they could study Chinese architecture, had to study Chinese religion. This was necessary because every detail of Chinese building design hinges on the religion and superstitions of its people.

All architecture in China is on a triangular basis, representing the trinity of the Chinese religion, and the dragon, symbol of immortality, reaching toward the earth, is the basic principle of its decoration.

Chinese roofs always curl up at the eaves—that descending evil spirits may be caught on these eaves and turned upward into the air again. Strange walls, known as "spirit walls," are built on a certain formula to foil evil spirits.

CHAIN STORES ARE UPHELD BY COURT RULING

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19. (AP)—Corporations operating chain drug stores were declared by the supreme court to be entitled to licenses notwithstanding state laws providing that the owners of such stores must be registered pharmacists. The court declared a Pennsylvania law of that nature invalid and unconstitutional.

KU KLUX KLAN CRITICISED BY HIGHEST COURT

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19. (AP)—In an opinion delivered by Justice Van Devanter and bristling with criticism of the Ku Klux Klan, the Supreme court today upheld a New York law requiring unincorporated associations, requiring an oath as a condition of membership to file detailed information with the secretary of state.

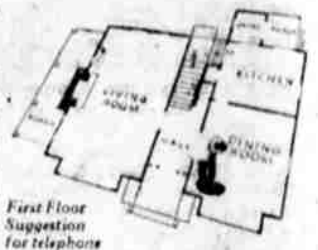
