FIVE TROJANS ON HURT LIST

W. S. C. Cougars Give U. S. C. Hard Treatment On Saturday

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 20. (AP)—Although the Washington State Cougars failed to beat the Southern California Trojans here Saturday, they clawed the underdoged Warhorse of Troy to such an extent that five of the regulars may not see action against the rampaging Idaho vandals this week.

Lloyd Thomas, Harry Edelson, Marzer Apelt, Francis Tappan and Charlie Boren, all first string men, are on the hospital list nursing wounds inflicted by the northern Wildcats, while Nathan Harrager, who was in uniform Saturday, also was badly banged up.

There was some sunshine at Hayward Field, however, for Don Williams made his first appearance in a week and George Templeton, first sub-center, was back on the firing line. Templeton will probably start Saturday.

The Idaho team is said to be in excellent shape, the two weeks respite between their Cougar and Montana games having given Coach Charlie Erb's recuperating crimples the necessary rest to bring them near the peak of their physical condition this season.

NOTED FIGHTER CUT IN FIGHT

Babe Hunt Slashed With Knife In Argument With Farmer

BLACKWELL, Okla., Nov. 20. (AP)—Babe Hunt of Ponca City, Okla., who has a long string of one and two round knockout fights to his credit and who is regarded as a coming heavyweight contender, has met his master out of the ring and today has a permanent memento of the encounter.

A knife slash, extending from Hunt's mouth to his left ear, which will keep him from the ring for two months, always will recall to the heavyweight that he lost an argument over the right-of-way on a bridge to an enraged farmer here last night.

Hunt's car sideswiped a wagon driven by Jim Vickers, 40, a farmer. A companion of the fighter jumped from the car and seized the farmers' horses, while Hunt himself approaches the driver, Vickers, who said he feared a beating, went into action with his pocketknife to deliver a knockout blow early in the opening round. He was arrested, but Hunt said he did not wish to prosecute.

Nineteen putts on eighteen greens! That's the story of Ralph Guldahl's record-breaking round at the Bob-o-Links golf course at Dallas, Texas, a round that bettered the former course record of 67 by no less than three strokes.

This is the fewest number of putts on eighteen holes I have heard of since I broadcast C. A. Windle's twenty-three putts for that number of greens, which he claimed was a world's record. The record for putts is getting so low now that in order to beat or tie, it will be necessary for some golfers to start sinking their approach shots.

During the eighteen holes Guldahl had nine birdies. While his putter was heated to a fever pitch, one of the gallery wrote me, one must not overlook the marvelous approach shots he made in making his great record. Time after time he would throw his second shot so close to the cup that there was obviously no reason for putting it out—other than the fact that a course record was in the balance and they must be dropped.

(AP)—A possibility that two of Stanford's star gridgers may not be able to play in the big game against California Saturday was seen here in the announcement that Tiny Sellman, tackle, is in the hospital with influenza, and Walt Heinecke, center, again injured his shoulder in the Washington game last week.

Sellman had just about recovered from an attack of the flu when he played in the Washington game, and it is believed that the exertion gave him a relapse. Heinecke has had trouble with his shoulder all season.

The remainder of the Stanford gridgers spent yesterday in perfecting their running attack, and Coach "Pop" Warner indicated that he will pound on this for the remainder of this week's practice sessions.

BOSTON, Nov. 20. (AP)—The Boston Post says that it has become a generally accepted fact at Harvard that Arnold Horween, of Chicago, head coach of football, will direct the team for the last time at Yale next Saturday. Although no official action has been taken, the Post says it is expected that Eddie Casey, all-American halfback in 1919 and for the last three years head coach of as many remarkable Harvard freshmen teams, will succeed his chief.

Harvard freshmen under Casey have met but one reverse since he took charge in 1926 and their victories have included three straight wins over Yale.

FARMINGTON, N. M., Nov. 20. (UP)—Sheriff George Blanchett has been unable to obtain any new clues as to the identity of the masked men who kidnaped Rafael Benavides from the hospital here Friday and lynched him to a tree outside of town.

The sheriff is working on reports that there was a much larger number of persons present at the lynching than previously reported.

Benavides was kidnaped from the Farmington hospital where he was placed after being wounded by a posse which captured him after an assault upon Mrs. Charles Lewis, aged wife of an Artee sheepman.



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
