All Gone Is Big-Time Gambling's Caste; It's Just A Racket Now

Elegance and Tradition Give Way to Ingloriousness; "Bumping Off" of Rothstein a Symbol

NEW YORK, Nov. 21.—Arnold Rothstein, big-time gambler, has passed ignominiously from the New York chance-taking scene, and the "profess" is lamenting anew the evil days on which major gaming has come in this native home of the Dick Cantfields, the "Honest John" Kelly, and all the rest of a long and distinguished line.

It's a clandestine, hither-and-yon rather than a fixed and stable proposition, with individual finishes such as Rothstein's—drab, inglorious finishes—always likely to be waiting just around the corner.

The gambling industry still enlists a numerous personnel in New York. At least 18,000 persons are engaged in it in one way or another, it is said.

They summoned Rosenthal to the front of the Metropolitan hotel by a telephone message, just as Rothstein was summoned to a room in the Park Central. There Rosenthal "got it" at the hands of Gyp the Blood, Lefty Louis, and their mates—with Police Lieutenant Charles Becker in the background.
