LUMBER ORDERS SHOW INCREASE

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 21. (AP)—Reports from 77 southern pine mills show orders increased 1.84 per cent over previous week; shipments increased 5.91 per cent and production decreased 2.24 per cent. The mills show 42,591,450 feet ordered, 46,745,668 feet shipped and 42,925,610 feet produced with orders on hand at end of last week amounting to 174,299,167 feet. The same mills reported in the corresponding week of 1927 (week ended Friday, November 18, 1927); orders booked, 48,194,984; shipments, 48,428,738; production 50,291,784; orders on hand at end of week, 160,292,556 feet.

LEAKING SHIPS LIMP TO PORT

Toll of Storm Dead On Atlantic Side Mounts To 100

LONDON, Nov. 21. (UP)—Vessels which were battered and crippled in last week-end's storm continued to stagger into port today as the toll of dead in England and northern Europe mounted to almost 100. Meteorologists warned tonight that more storms were expected through the British Isles.

The Dutch liner Crynens from the West Indies and central American ports reached Plymouth tonight, reporting seven days of continuous gales and terrific seas. A few passengers suffered minor injuries.

At the same time the board of trade officially announced that an investigation of the Rye harbor life boat sinking in which 17 men lost their lives would be held shortly. The Rye harbor disaster was the first of many accidents to large and small vessels which cost a number of lives during the four-day storm.

Meteorologists said the gale Thursday was the worst general storm in many years. Twenty-five persons lost their lives in isolated accidents in England; 17 died in the Rye harbor, Kent, disaster; 15 persons (12 in one family)
