

PREPARE FOR TWO EAST-WEST GRID CONTESTS

Final Coast Conference Standings Give, Oregon Rates Fourth

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 30. (AP)—Two clashes rang down the curtain yesterday on the drama of 1928 Pacific Coast conference football and today interest has centered on the two events that support western hopes in inter-sectional conflict.

At New York tomorrow in the Yankee stadium, Stanford university tackles the Army Grid-ders of West Point while at Los Angeles the University of Southern California hopes to send Knute Rockne's men of Notre Dame home with another defeat. Neither of the western teams are confident of victory but each has reason to believe neither game will be a walkaway for the victor.

The traveling gridders from South Bend were to arrive at Los Angeles late today after two days of practice at Tucson, Arizona. Southern California's Trojans were to have a light workout and then rest at a Beverly Hills hotel until game time.

Both teams are in good physical condition and neither claims a certain victory.

Yesterday's games served to drop Washington State down one notch in the final standings when the Cougars lost to the University of Washington 6-0 after registering a total yardage gain in scrimmage passes and punts that exceeded the Victor's. Starting the season in anything but the usual fashion of the "Purple Tornado," the university eleven showed a decided improvement during its last few games and yesterday added the needed bright spot.

The University of Oregon overwhelmed the less experienced and lighter conference babe, the University of California at Los Angeles 26 to 6. Gonzaga University of Spokane, a non-conference member took a beating from the University of Montana 7 to 0 while at San Francisco St. Mary's University won from Santa Clara 20 to 7.

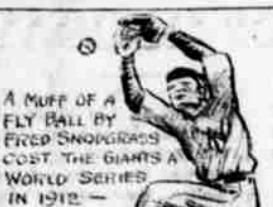

A Little Aid, a Little Twist—and a Touchdown!

There has always been a tendency among football followers

of calling a game that is won or lost by a fumble or fluke. Losing by a fumble is no more cause for new gray hairs in the coach's head, than by line chargin'. They're both football. The alertness of a team in recovering fumbles is as important as line bucking. The best open field runner in the world is useless without the ball in his possession. The loser always calls a forward pass "lucky." If the loser misses one it is "unlucky." The fact is that they're both football!

A fumble in football really corresponds to an error in baseball, whether it is a booted ground ball or a muffed fly ball. Football fans who bemoan a game lost by a fumble should remember that famous muff of Fred Snodgrass that cost the Giants a world's championship. The Boston Red Sox did not win simply on base hits, but through Snodgrass' physical lapse and the game gave them the championship just as surely as if they had won it with a barrage of extra base blows. Errors and fumbles are just as much part of the games as are base hits and first downs from scrimmage.
