MILLER KAYDS J. McLARNIN

May Get Chance to Fight
Mandell for Crown
of Lightweight

DETROIT, Dec. 1. (AP)—Ray Miller, blonde haired 22 year old Chicago youth, today is brewing poison for Sammy Mandell, world's lightweight champion.

Miller, heretofore regarded as an in and out in the boxing business, became the foremost contender for Mandell's title, as a result of his smashing victory over Jimmy McLarnin, the baby faced puncher from Los Angeles, in their battle in the Olympia arena last night. Miller, a 5 to 1 shot in the betting, scored a surprising triumph when he stopped McLarnin, acknowledged king of lightweight sluggers, in the seventh round of their scheduled 10 round battle.

The victory goes into the record books as a technical knockout for Miller. McLarnin, bleeding from an ugly gash under his right eye, his face a smear of blood, sat in his corner hopelessly beaten and unable to respond to the bell for the start of the eighth round. His handlers, realizing another punch might find him stretched unconscious on the floor of the ring, humbly tossed a towel within the ropes, indicating defeat. It was the first knockout ever registered against McLarnin.

The Babe tolerated Lou's going around at all times without a hat, but when Gehrig started to go in the dining room without a coat one day at the hotel during spring training, it was more than the Bambino could stand.

With the football boys thundering down the home stretch, the nominations for backfield positions on the mythical All-American eleven are coming in from every section.

Of course, early November outlook is entirely different from what it will be after Thanksgiving Day. But enough scintillating performances have been turned in by stars of every football sector to serve warning that the choice of four backfield performers who will find practically unanimous agreement from experts the country over will be as hard this year as any other.

The outstanding backfield performer of the season so far is Christian Keener Cagle, ace of the West Point eleven. His team is playing one of the hardest schedules ever planned, having met and defeated Southern Methodist, Yale and Harvard during October. In all games Cagle starred. His brilliant performances have caused critics to compare him with the backfield greats of all time.

Other outstanding backs in the East during October were Al Masters of Dartmouth, Kenneth Strong of New York university, Paul Scull of Pennsylvania, Hal Baysinger of Syracuse, Howard Haysister of Carnegie Tech, Al Wittmer of Princeton, Johnny Garvey of Yale—and that is only part of the list.

The Middle West seems to have fewer All-American backfield candidates this year than they have had in recent years, although Brooks, Nazurski of Minnesota, Hayes McLain of Iowa, Blue Howell of Nebraska, Pest Welch of Purdue, Chuck Bennett of Illinois, Humbert of Illinois, Brazill of

Detroit and Gebert of Marquette are getting various nominations. And from all sections come other nominations for the All-American backfield. The South offers Redman Hume of Southern Methodist, Stumpy Thomason and Warren Mitchell at Georgia Tech, Jake Hanna at Centenary among others. The Rocky Mountain section says Dutch Clark of Colorado college rates with the best. And from the Pacific coast you hear that it will be a shame not to consider Lloyd Thomas and Don Williams of Southern California, Biff Hoffman and Chuck Carroll of Washington.

And, we might add, that ain't all!

J. J. BRADDOCK UPSETS DOPE BEATS "TUFFY"

NEW YORK, Dec. 1. (AP)—James J. Braddock, of Jersey City, N. J., languishing in obscurity for some months, has jumped into prominence as a result of a surprising two round knockout of Tuffy Griffiths, Sioux City, Ia., light heavyweight sensation, at Madison Square Garden last night.

Nineteen thousand fans came to see Tuffy dispose of his eastern foe in short order. They remained to cheer while the home-bred, boxing cleverly and punching hard, knocked Griffiths down four times in the second round before Referee McPartland halted hostilities and carried the Iowa, unconscious, to his corner.

BRADDOCK WINS FROM GRIFFITHS

Harlem Boy Buttons 'Kid' Chocolate in First; Gets Draw

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, Nov. 30. (UP)—James J. Braddock of Jersey City, N. J., knocked out "Tuffy" Griffiths, Sioux City, Iowa, heavyweight, in the second round of their bout last night.

Griffiths never had been defeated before. He was a 4 to 1 favorite, and Braddock was regarded as just a trial horse for him.

Both Tuffy and Braddock are in the light heavy class actually, but critics had regarded Tuffy as a possible successor for Gene Tunney in the unlimited class, and their bout was one of Ricky and a elimination ones for the heavy title.

Griffiths, who changed his name from Gerald Ambrose to "Tuffy" when he entered upon his ring career a few months ago, came east with the reputation of having won 55 or 56 straight fights. Against Braddock, he showed nothing to justify his reputation except a world of game-ness.

"Kid" Chocolate, Cuban bantamweight, was knocked loose from his sunny smile by the very first punch in the semi-final bout and had all he could do to come back and earn a draw with tough little Joe Scalaparo of Harlem.

Chocolate had been rated another George Dixon, but one wild looping overhand right sent him down for the count of seven before the echo of the opening bell had died away.

It was the nearest Kid Chocolate ever had come to defeat. He weighed 129; Scalaparo 117½.

Vince Dundee, Baltimore, 15½, defeated Izzy Grove, New York, 14½, in 16 rounds.
