RANDALL DIES AFTER FIGHT

community hall. At the conclusion of the dance, so the story runs, Mr. and Mrs. Randall went outside with a Mr. Gooden and Mr. and Mrs. Morley followed them out.

Women Battle
Morley walked up to Randall and said: "We'll finish this thing now." The wife of the murdered man stated yesterday, in telling her story to officers, Mrs. Randall stepped between them and said: "No trouble between you two."

At the interference of Mrs. Randall, it is stated, Morley's wife grabbed and jerked her from between the two men with such force that both women fell to the ground.

Morley, freed to act by the intervention of his wife, picked up a club and rushed at Randall, striking him a blow on the side of the head, according to Mrs. Randall, and her husband sank to the ground, unconscious. Morley then hit his old enemy twice more with the club, it is stated.

By this time others at the dance interfered, and the injured man was carried to a residence and put to bed. A doctor was summoned from Lakeview, but could do nothing, so Randall was brought to a local hospital about 10:30 Friday morning, where he passed away yesterday evening about 5:30 without ever regaining consciousness.

Old Enemies
The two men had been enemies for a long time, according to Randall's wife, who stated that at one time when she was landlady of a rooming house Morley had struck her and knocked her down; Randall came in upon the scene and blither words ensued.

Whether liquor entered into the quarrel or not is not known, but the fact remains that four arrests on charges of sale and possession of liquor were made during the evening at the community hall, and two arrests on possession charges.

Randall, who is a native of Missoula, Mont., was 46 years of age at the time of his death. He and his wife have resided in Chiloquin for the past two years. The body is in charge of the Earl Whitlock funeral home, where an inquest will be held this evening at 7:30.

About noon Friday word was circulated around Bly that Randall had died. The belief is that Morley, fearing arrest, made an effort to put a large amount of distance between himself and Klamath county officers. When Louis Mueller, deputy sheriff, and Clarence Worden, prohibition officer, arrived at Bly they learned of Morley's disappearance.

The officers decided that if Morley had taken the road to Lakeview he would arrive late and would probably remain there all night. They went on to Lakeview, where they searched the garages for Morley's car, finally finding it. Morley was discovered a few minutes later, arrested, brought to Klamath Falls and lodged in the county jail under the charge of assault armed with a dangerous weapon. Officers did not inform him of Randall's death last night. Mrs. Morley was with her husband in Lakeview but did not accompany him here.

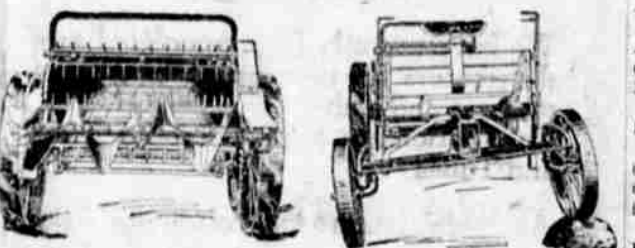
