"ONE BIG DAY" TEAMS SHATTER CHAMPIONSHIP

Season's In One Long Series Of Upsets By Under-dogs

NEW YORK, Dec. 6, (AP)—Football teams that had a "big day" this year are more conspicuous than those enjoying big seasons from start to finish.

Some such as Georgia Tech, Florida, Boston College and Detroit, have been good all the way but most of the others were good only when they had "it."

The disposition has been to "throw out" the days when they didn't have "it."

N. Y. U. partisans still were hazy "throwing out" the Georgetown defeat when alone comes Oregon State, which couldn't be "thrown out" at all.

Nevertheless N. Y. U. against Carnegie Tech had its big day when the Violets impressed the critics that they were as violent as any team in the country.

Only a guess can be made as to the ensuing shock if the violence of N. Y. U., as exhibited against Carnegie, had been tossed against the counter-violence of Stanford and turned loose against the army.

The naval academy has two big days, and both were at the expense of other teams not otherwise defeated, Princeton and Pennsylvania. Carnegie had its big day against Notre Dame, and Notre Dame against the Army, and the Army against Nebraska.

Teams of the Big Ten and the Southwestern conferences had a merry-go-round of big days, the object apparently being to take a pot shot at any team presumptuous enough to gain the lead.

Turning to more consistency, however, it is difficult to find a more impressive record in conference competition than that of the Armstrong's Utah Indians, who won the Rocky Mountain title by the simple but direct expedient of sweeping all four of the teams that ranked next to them in the final standing.

Utah experienced a pair of off days when the team was led by Croighton and Brigham Young, but the Indians went on their warpath any time they met a real contender.

One sending can operate an indefinite number of type setting machines, either in the same room or cities far apart. A receiving printer is provided, that without interfering with the automatic typesetting, enables an editor to read what is coming over the wire. The Teletype setter stops automatically the moment anything stops the type setting machine it feeds.

The Teletype setter is a development of automatic telegraph printers, differing principally in but one respect, that it uses a tape with six punch units, instead of the standard five units. 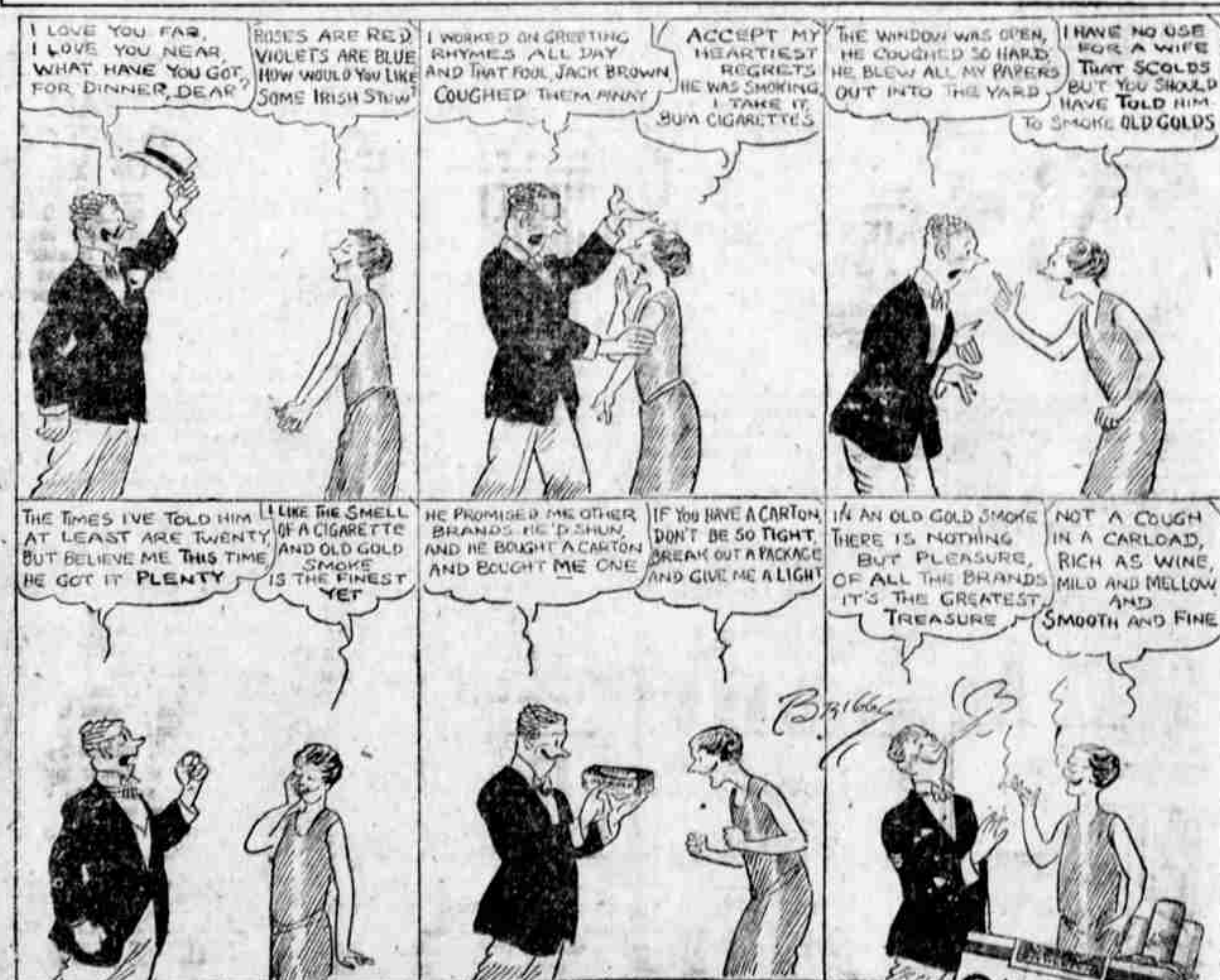
